OTTAWA GROCERS TO STAND ALOOF

Many Long-Established Firms
Will Refuse to Handle
Beer.

SOME ALARM FELT

Canadian Press Despatch.
Ottawa, March 20.—The proposal in the amendments to the Ontario temperance act, which will enable the new 44 beer to be sold by grocers for delivery to the homes, does not seem to find much support so far as Ottawa is concerned. Old-time grocers of many years' stand-
ing and repute say they will not handle it.

So far as the prohibitionists are concerned, they are strongly opposed to it.

It is a long time—longer than most of us can remember—since the people wiped out the last grocery store license, said Mr. Bailey in an interview today. "Now we are going back to the old conditions."

HOUSE APPROVES
MOVE BY PREMIER

Votes To Send Plans To De-
feat Combines To Select
Committee.

MAJORITY IS 95

Canadian Press Despatch.
Ottawa, March 20.—The Conserva-
tive amendment to the government resolution on the Petersen contract was defeated in the house this morn-
ing by 108 votes. The Progressive
voted solidly in support of the gov-
ernment, and the Conservatives
solidly for the amendment.

The main motion was then carried by a 95 majority, the vote stat-
ing 133; says 38. Some Progress-
ive and both Labor members joined the Conservatives in opposing the
resolution. Mr. King then moved
that the resolution be referred to a
special committee.

Ottawa, March 20.—"If the house
doesn't carry this resolution, if it
refuses to let us send this matter to
a committee, honorable members will
very soon find that it will be taken
elsewhere." Thus Premier Mac-
kenzie King declared the position of
the government late tonight, and
challenged any attempt to block com-
mittee consideration of the gov-
ernment's policy of securing control of
Atlantic routes.

The statement was made as a re-
joinder to attacks of the Conservative
opposition. The prime minister
further emphasized the attitude of
the government on the ocean freight
rates control measure by announcing
that as soon as the house had passed
the motion to have the house go into
committee on the resolution he
would move that the resolution itself,
in addition to the bill embodying
the Petersen contract, be re-
ferred to the special committee to
be appointed.

This was implementation of the
premier's repeated assertions that
the government was not asking the
house to endorse the Petersen con-
tract until the whole matter had been
investigated by the committee. The
effect of this action is to more clearly
nullify the contention of the oppo-
sition of the government members were
committing themselves to the Petersen
contract.

The prime minister stated that he
took this course in view of the ap-
parent feeling of some members that
support of the motion committed them
to something more than approval of
the principle of ocean freight rates
control. Mr. King and all those who
have spoken for the government have
explained since the commencement
of the debate that the principle of
ocean freight rates control was being
voted on in the motion to place
the government's measure before the
special committee.

There was vigorous opposition and
some of the Progressives have con-
tended that the reference to the com-
mittee implied indorsement of the
Petersen contract. The prime min-
ister has taken this extra step in
order to establish the government's
position beyond a question.

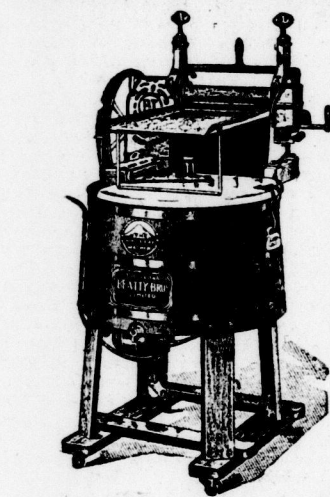

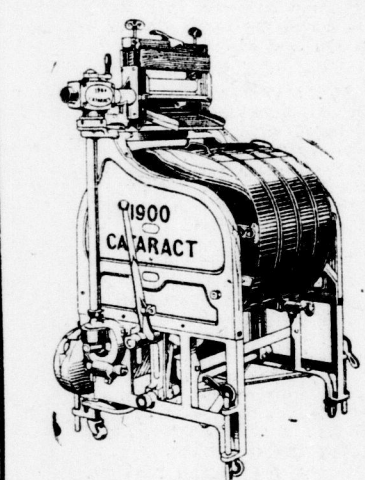

story behind Marquis Curzon's death
this morning that is probably with-
out precedent in British journalism.

For days the statesman has been
lying on his sick-bed, fully con-
scious. Every morning he appealed
for his favorite newspaper, and every

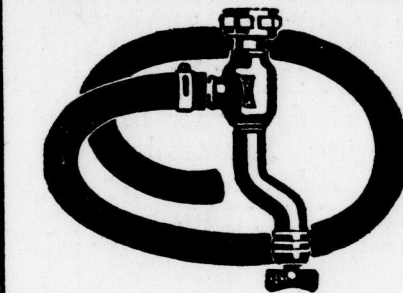
morning his physicians, fearful of
the effect their own published bul-
letins recording the gravity of his
illness might have on their patient,
were forced to refuse his request.

Yesterday it was seen he had
entered upon the last phase of his
heroic struggle with death. The
physicians, searching for every pos-
sible means to buoy up the dying

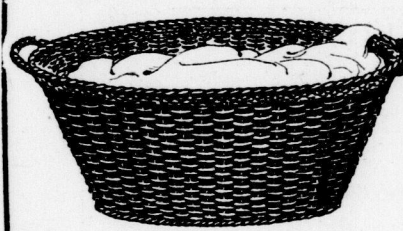
marquis, appealed to the paper in
question.

It is not usual for a great London
daily to be willing to halt its presses,
but the editors replied that they
would issue a special edition of one
copy announcing Lord Curzon's re-
covery.

And so, while Lord Curzon's life

side edition" was prepared. But al-
most at the moment the huge presses
had turned out their message of en-
couragement the end came. The one
copy edition was never read by the
one for whom it was published.



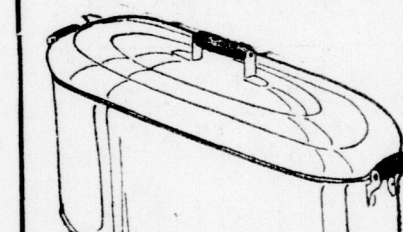

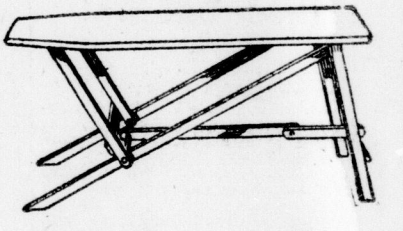

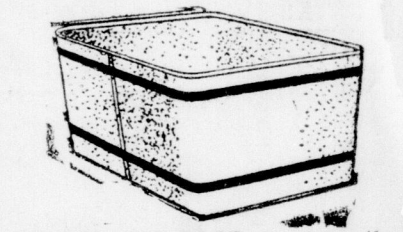

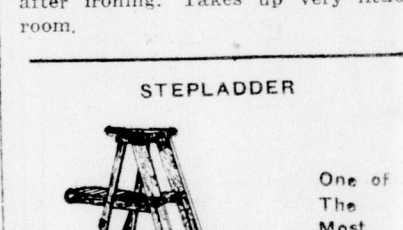

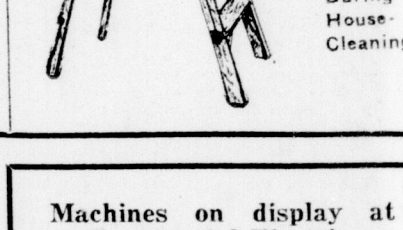
