PROF. TRENHOLME DIES IN MISSOURI

Was in University History Department Here in 1900 and 1901.

The death took place recently at Columbia, Mo., of Professor Norman Maclaren Trenholme, chairman of the department of history in the University of Missouri, who in 1900 and 1901 was professor of history in Western university. There are many in London who will remember the young teacher who came here from Harvard, though of the present faculty of the university Dr. N. C James is the only one who was or the staff at that time.

Dr. Trenholme was born in Montreal in 1874, his father being a judge of the court of king's bench in the province of Quebec. He was educated at McGill and Harvard, receiving the degree of Ph.D. from the latter institution in 1899, after which he spent two years in graduate work and travel in Europe.

After leaving Western university, Dr Trenholme was for a year on the staff of Pennsylvania state college and then went to the University of Missouri, where in 1905 he became chairman of the department of history. In 1919 he was appointed chairman of the junior college committee. He was the author of several books in the field of history and a frequent contributor to the his-torical magazines. He was a memtorical magazines. He was a member of the American Historical association, the Mississippi Valley Historical association, and the Royal Historical society of Great Britain. His first wife was Ida Ethel Hurst, of Montreal, to whom he was married in 1901. She died in 1917. In 1923 he was married to Anna Louise
