With a shudder and a clatter of teeth, Mills told the court that he couldn't sleep all night. He had nightmares, he said. It is reported that Winston Churchill, chancellor of the exchequer, is considering the question of an increased tax on beer which would enrich the exchequer to the extent of £20,000, 000 sterling a year on the basis of the country's present consumption
