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BYLAW NEEDS AID OF SERVICE CLUBS

Lions Appealed to by Dr. Grant For Assistance to Nurses' Home Measure.

Cub President Gillanders presided before 23 members at the weekly meeting of the local Lion club at their weekly luncheon in the Tecumseh house last evening. Merriment held sway as usual during the luncheon and the entertainment. The Lion club quartet was in attendance.

Dr. Alfred Grant of his city was speaker of the evening, and he delivered an address on the "Care of the Sick as a Community Project." Dr. Grant explained the evolution of the care of the sick from the first centuries until the present day. The care of the sick at the present time is one of the greatest responsibilities resting with modern communities.

"There are three elements that tend to the successful operation of hospitals which are the greatest aid in the care of the sick," declared Dr. Grant, "and these are the support rendered by service clubs, such as you are members of, the support of the laymen, and the aid of the medical world combined with the greatest of all, the nursing profession."

"These young ladies, of the finest type available, are required to have their matriculation, that they must go through a three-months period on probation, after which they have a three-year training course of twelve hours a day, seven days a week, often more, before they are graduated as nurses." In his address, Dr. Grant outlined the inadequacies of the present housing plan of the Victoria nurses as an expensive, unsatisfactory system. The residents of the nurses' home built 25 years ago to accommodate 60 have grown to an enormous number, and the inadequate and fruitless schemes to house them are a waste of money. The only sensible way out is the construction of the money-saving nurses' home to be voted on in the coming city election. Dr. Grant asked the Lions as a service club, and as one of the successful elements of a successful hospital to give the nurses' home project a boost.

The Lions, many of whom are interested in the new hotel project, questioned Dr. Grant of the hotel committee as to what progress was being made in the building plans. Dr. Grant stated that a committee had been appointed to make arrangements with a construction company, and that the ground would be broken in a few weeks. During the evening's business it was decided formally that instead of a bridge and church party, a dance would be held for the purpose of raising Christmas funds to go to charity. It was unanimously decided that the weekly luncheons will start in the future at 6:15 p.m., and business be finished by 8 o'clock, in order to leave the evenings free.

The membership committee of the club will put on a special day for members at the beginning of the new year. Plans will be under way immediately, to make the drive successful.

J. A. STILES LECTURES ON 'AIDS TO SCOUTMASTERSHIP'

"Aids to Scoutmastership" was the title of an interesting lecture delivered last night at the semi-weekly session of the scoutmaster course being held in Cronyn Hall by John A. Stiles, assistant dominion commissioner, former dean of applied science, and a noted engineering authority at the University of New Brunswick. To make a success of his work the scoutmaster must know the boy spirit and understand boy psychology. The boy expects in the scoutmaster a man of great modesty, yet with great ability and power, who can do many things well.

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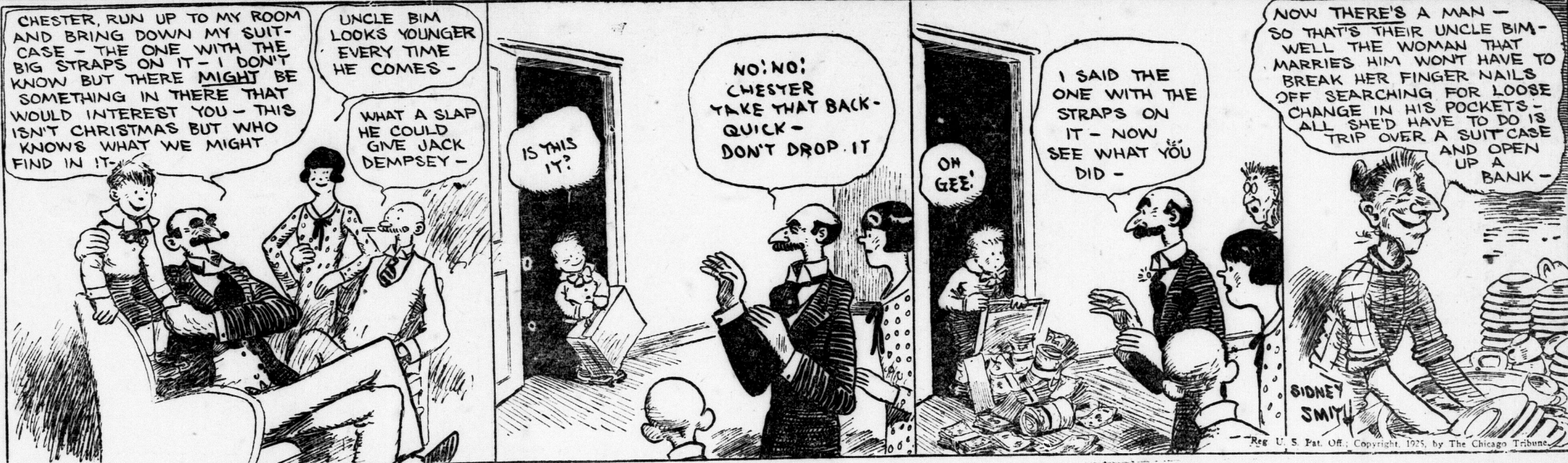

ETIMARS HEAR PROF. LANDON SPEAK ON COLORED RACE

Professor Fred Landon delivered an address to the Etimars last night at their weekly meeting in Cronyn Hall. Professor Landon spoke on the colored races in America, and stated that they were brought to this country as labor in the newly founded colonies. He said that the colored people were labor at that time being imported to the land being available in such large quantities, and slaves then filled the necessity for labor. The idea that the negro was a slave here is entirely wrong, declared Professor Landon. The negro was purely a farm laborer in the early days, and is emancipated now. Dave Finlayson, president of the Etimars, was in the chair for the evening.
