The residents of the nurses' home built 29 years ago to accommodate 60 have grown to an enormous number, and idiotic and fruitless schemes to them are a waste of money. The only sensible way out is the construction of the money-saving nurses' home to be voted on in the coming city elections Dr. Grant asked the Lions as a service club and as one of the successful elements of a successful hospital to give the nurses' home project a boost. The Lions, many of whom are inter-

ested in the new hotel project, ques-tioned Dr. Grant of the hotel commit-tee as to what progress was being made in the building plans. Dr. Grant stated that a committee had been appointed to make arrangements with a construction company, and that the ground would be broken in a few weeks. 
