Ald. Glover moved a resolution endorsing the petitions just read, and advising the citizens to sign them. So far as he was personally concerned he had no use for personally concerned he had no use for Chinese or Japanese either, and he would assist in every possible way the movement for their exclusion.

Ald. Marchant came forward in response to repeated calls. Though it was no doubt an unpopular thing to admit, he must state that he did not agree with a great deal of what is said against the Chinese; and he instanced the allegations in the petition that they are immoral, dishonest and unclean, which reproaches, he considered, apply equally to many white men. With respect to taking money out of the country, he thought that a good deal more is taken by the absentee landlords and mortgage holders than by the Chinese. He was proceeding, as he said, to affirm his belief, in common with Ald. He approved, too, of the protection of labor by trades unions, and of the extension of this protection by discouraging the importation protection by discouraging the importation into this country of Chinese, whose competition the weakest of our own people feel the strongest. He, therefore, in the present condition of affairs would favor such a resolution as now before the meeting.

Mr. H. Dallas Helmcken, M.P.P., was then vociferously called for and took the platform amidst applause. He said he had always felt very deeply upon this subject of Chinese competition with white labor, but such incidents as those connected with the recent visit of Li Hung Chang to England and other countries of Europe make one pause for action. He had often heard it argued that Great Britain will not stand legislation by her colonies altogether excluding the Chinese or any other nation, but he felt confident that so long as the legislation of the colonies is reasonable Great Britain will not interfere with it. He hoped that if the petitions read here to-night are forwarded to Ottawa, something will be heard of them from there. He knew of no way in which we as a province could deal with the matter, except to join in asking relief from the authorities at Ottawa, through our own representatives who are sometimes called in to advise, (Laughter.) We could do something for ourselves, however, by each giving the preference to white men in any work we have to do. Any service he could render in the local house he would be only too happy to perform.
