Council reassembled at 2 o'clock pursuant to adjournment. All present. Minutes of forenoon session read.

Moved and seconded that the minutes of this forenoon session be adopted as read.—**Carried.**

Moved by Councillor Arsenault, seconded by Councillor Goulet That Joel Paradis be appointed a constable for the County of Restigouche.—**Carried.**

Moved and seconded That Councillor Chaytor be appointed a member of the assessment committee in place of ex-Councillor Stewart.—**Carried.**

Moved and seconded that the Public Lands and Building Committee be authorized to have the telephone placed in the record office and that the secretary treasurer be authorized to pay the quarterly bills, as they are presented.—**Carried.**

Moved and seconded That the assessment committee retire and prepare report on assessment required for the year 1909.—**Carried.**

Moved by Councillor Dawson, seconded by Councillor Mowat That this Council adjourn until nine o'clock this evening, when the legal adviser will be present.

Moved amendment by Councillor McBeath, seconded by Councillor Goulet That we adjourn until 10 o'clock tomorrow morning. On vote being taken original motion was carried.

Council reassembled at 9 o'clock, pursuant to adjournment. All present.

Moved by Councillor Montgomery, seconded by Councillor Arsenault That the means of bond issue be adopted by this Council for the payment of the indebtedness of the Municipality.—**Carried.**

Councillor Montgomery, seconded by Councillor Arsenault, moved the following resolution:

Whereas during the past year the expenditure on contingent account of the Municipality has been extraordinary largely owing to the recent smallpox expenditure, and there is now an indebtedness, payable by the Municipality of ten thousand dollars, which it is desirable to liquidate and in the opinion of this Council it is inadvisable to order assessment for the whole of the said amount at this time.

Be it therefore resolved that a petition of this Municipality be submitted to the legislative assembly at its first ensuing session, praying for the passage of an act authorizing the issue of bonds by the Municipality in amounts of five hundred dollars each, not exceeding in the whole ten thousand dollars, said bonds to bear interest at five per cent. per annum, and to be payable one half in five years and the balance in ten years from date of issue for which a sinking fund of eight hundred and fifty dollars shall be annually ordered, and that on the proper authority being obtained the warden and secretary treasurer be authorized and directed to forthwith issue the said bonds under the corporate seal and their own hands, and to negotiate the sale of same when complete, including the power and authority on behalf of the Municipality to use the said bonds when issued

as collateral for the purpose of securing any chartered bank or private person or any loan which they may obtain for the uses of the municipality of said bonds.—**Carried.**

Moved by Councillor Murchie seconded by Councillor Dawson, that this Council petition the local government to change the Chairman of the Board of Health, and give the appointment to some good business man in the county. Carried, councillor Arsenault voting nay.

Account Robert Crawford, Constable, \$11.70, referred to the legal adviser again taken up, and recommended at \$6.30 by the legal adviser.

Moved and seconded That this account of Constable Crawford be disallowed.

Moved in amendment by Councillor Mowat, seconded by Councillor St. Onge, That the account of Mr. Crawford lay over till tomorrow to give me time to consult with Mr. Crawford. On vote being taken the original motion was carried.

Moved and seconded That this Council adjourn until 10 o'clock tomorrow morning.—**Carried.**

The sum of three thousand two hundred dollars for school. The sum of two hundred dollars for poor and the sum of three hundred and thirty seven 89-100 dollars for parish indebtedness.

And that the said warden and secretary treasurer or either of them be and they are hereby authorized to do and perform any other act in relation to the said loan that may be required, and that the said sum after being borrowed be deposited to the credit of the said Municipality and drawn from time to time, as required, and applied to current demands upon the Municipality until such time as the ordinary revenue or cash from issue of bonds shall be sufficient to pay all moneys borrowed or overdrawn under this resolution, and that the secretary treasurer be authorized to furnish to whom it may concern a certified copy of this resolution with the County seal affixed.—**Carried.**

Moved by Councillor Chaytor, seconded by Councillor Murchie and resolved That the petition already directed to be presented to the legislation by this Municipality contain a further prayer for the passage of an act conveying authority to the sheriff of Restigouche to use, employ and put to labor any and all prisoners confined in the common goal of said County of Restigouche in respect to or under sentences imposed for criminal or quasi criminal violation of the law.—**Carried.**

Moved by Councillor Montgomery, seconded by Councillor Lawlor That this Council adjourn.—**Carried.**

CANADA'S POOR CONSUMPTIVES.

A Story more Touching than anything from the Pen of the gifted Ian MacLaren.

In the current issue of the Bona or Bona, published by the National Sanatorium Association, 347 King Street West, Toronto, a page is given over to letters received from the many persons from all parts of the Dominion seeking admission to the Muskoka Free Hospital for Consumptives.

"I am a young married man, twenty-three years of age. For several years I have been sick, but always able to keep my feet. Now I have come to the time when I cannot work, and cannot get medicine without means. My lungs are affected, and I am writing now to see if you can get me into the Muskoka Free Hospital for Consumptives. My young wife is here, and her parents have kindly opened their doors to her if I go away."

"I have a patient suffering from pulmonary tuberculosis, who has been laid off work for about three months now—was in bed part of that time, but latterly both his pulse and temperature have kept down and his weight going up. He is the only support of the family—mother, crippled father, and younger brother, but his neighbors are trying to raise a small amount of money to help him."

"We have sometimes thought that if Ian MacLaren, who has given to us the character of Dr. McClure, were alive today that in letters such as those he would find material for a book more touching and pathetic in many parts than his Bona or Bona."

It is on behalf of cases like these, of which there are scores reaching the Secretary of the Sanatorium every week, that the Muskoka Free Hospital for Consumptives makes its appeal today for funds.

This institution has not at any time, since its doors were first opened in April, 1902, refused a single patient because of the applicant being unable to pay.
