IS CREDIT TO CAMPBELLTON

New Curling Rink One of Finest in Maritime Provinces—Splendid Club Rooms.

When the new rink and club rooms on Ritchie Street is completed within the next few days Campbellton will possess a curling rink which will, in size and up-to-date comfort compare very favorably with anything of its kind in the maritime provinces. The new building which provides ample room for four sheets of ice is 170 ft. in length and 68 ft. wide. This leaves sufficient room for spacious club quarters on both floors. The total cost, when completed, will be about \$12,000. The rink itself is a substantially constructed building, founded on a concrete sub-structure. It is warmly clad-boarded and careful provision has been made for adequate light. The front doors on the ground floor which the entrance gives ingress to is tastefully finished in beaver board and Douglas fir and besides providing cherry and comfortable club quarters will be used as an observatory by spectators watching the matches; as large windows run the length of the room in the rear wall facing the ice.

The banquet hall and kitchen are located on the second floor in convenient proximity to each other. This hall, which will be used for social meetings of the club runs the full width of the building, and is tastefully finished on the same plan as the lower room. It is the intention of the club to have this apartment luxuriously furnished and when completed it will doubtless be one of the most pleasing features of the new rink.

One party from St. John who travels extensively and who, incidentally, is an old curler, declares that Campbellton's new curling rink is equal to any in the maritime provinces.

OF INTEREST TO RETURNED MEN

Asked to Present Complaints and Suggestions Regarding Pensions.

A Royal Commission is to sit at St. John early in February for the purpose of investigating any complaints concerning pensions or any further suggestions former service men care to present. All claims are to be presented to a committee of not more than six who will present them at this sitting. At a recent conference of former service men of New Brunswick held at St. John, a committee was nominated for the purpose of preparing the arrangements and getting the final committee of six to argue any cases which they might find advisable to present. The committee is as follows:—E. A. Schuchfield, St. John, chairman; G. Charles Logan, St. John, secretary; G. B. Weldon, Moncton; J. P. Bourgeois, Moncton; H. B. McLean, Chatham; H. Priestman, McAdam Junction; John R. Gale, Dr. G. B. Peet; and Dr. J. A. McCarly, St. John, and A. L. Barry, New Glasgow.

Through the courtesy of the press this is given publication in the hope of reaching any ex-service men anywhere in the province, whether he is a member of any of the organizations or not. If any such man will present his case with particulars in writing to any branch of the G. W. V. A. or to C. B. Weldon, secretary-treasurer of the Army and Navy Veterans, Moncton, or address to G. Charles Logan, secretary to committee, at his address, P. O. Box 664, St. John, it will be given consideration.

Meetings of this committee will be held in McAdam Junction, Moncton and St. John, when individual cases will be heard. The committee is anxious to hear from the men at as early a date as possible, and as this may be the final hearing of these cases, those interested are requested to act promptly.
