RIOT AT WITLEYEcho of Canadian Camp Incident  
Heard In Court Again.

## CIVIL POLICE RESPONSIBLE

In Spite of Fact That Camp Had  
Military Police.

LONDON, Feb. 28.—(Canadian Press Cable).—An echo of the riot by Canadian soldiers at Witley Camp in February, 1919, was heard to-day, when the court of appeal dismissed an appeal by the Surrey County Council against being mulcted in the sum of £250, which had been awarded by a lower court to a shopkeeper at Witley Camp for damages as a result of the riot. The County Council contended that the camp was solely under military discipline and the civil police were not responsible for good order being kept there.

In the judgment given against the County Council the court of appeal states that it was natural and much easier, especially in the case of Dominion troops, that order in the camp should be looked after by the Dominion's own police.

"Sir Walter Scott told us," the judgment states, "that the Scottish archers in the service of Louis XI, of France, strongly protested against being handed by any French hangman and that there had always been a similar feeling among soldiers, but this did not show that the police were deprived of their rights over the area occupied by Witley Camp, though there were difficulties in exercising them caused by the very superior power of the military in time of war."

THRACE STARTS MOVE  
AGAINST THE GREEKS

BERNIE, Feb. 28.—An anti-Greek insurrection in Thrace, attended by sharp encounters near Xanthi, is reported from Bulgarian sources. The organization of Thracian Nationalists is said to be starting a general movement against Greece, while the entire population of Western Thrace is now armed.

CUSTOMS REVENUE  
SHOWS BIG INCREASESales Tax Is Responsible For Greater  
Part of Excess Over Last Year

OTTAWA, Feb. 28.—(Canadian Press Dispatch).—There has been an increase of over \$40,000,000 in the revenue received by the department of customs and excise during the 11 months of the current fiscal year as compared with the similar period last year.

Of this large increase nearly three-quarters was contributed by the sales tax and other excise taxes and a little more than one-quarter by customs duties. The revenue from excise duties on spirits and tobacco rose only a few thousand dollars and for the month of February itself showed a falling off.

The total revenue reported by the customs and excise department for the 11 months ending with February was \$259,612,000 as compared with \$209,728,000 for the corresponding period last year. Customs duties this year led with \$119,302,000 as compared with \$107,686,000 for 1921-22. Excise taxes came second with \$96,556,000 as compared with \$87,411,000 a year ago, and excise duties on spirits and tobacco this year have yielded \$23,859,000, as compared with \$23,672,000 for 1921-22.

For the month of February, 1923, by itself customs duties produced \$18,282,000 as compared with \$19,004,000 in February, 1922. Sales and other excise taxes brought in \$24,486,000 in February, 1923, as compared with \$25,570,000 in the same month of 1922. Excise duties on spirits and tobacco realized \$2,450,000 in the month just closed as against \$2,666,000 in February, 1922. This is the only decrease in revenue shown in the entire returns.

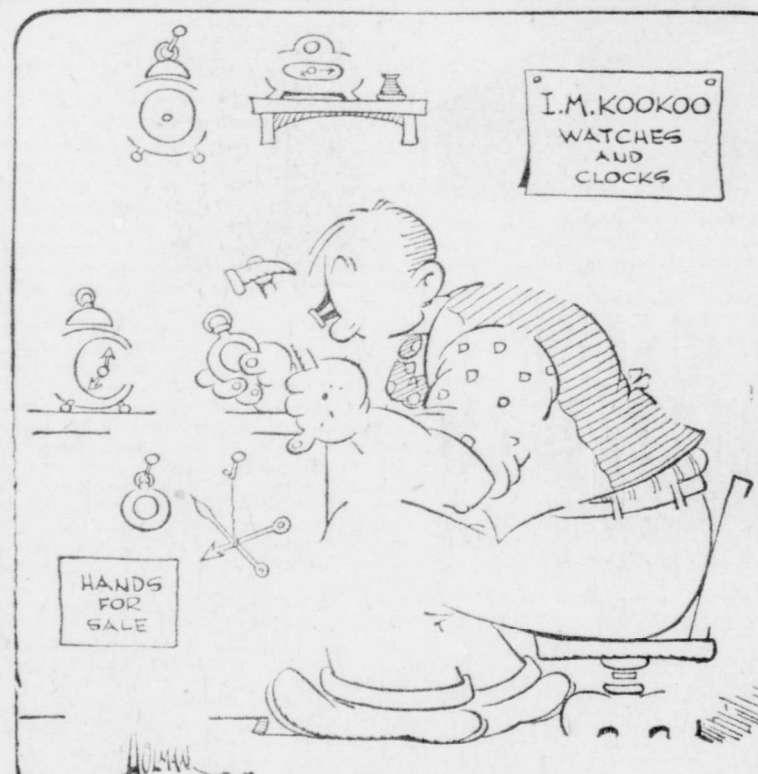

OLDEST PIONEER OF  
ELGIN COUNTY BURIED

Funeral of Mrs. Jane Toles, Who Died at the Age of 94, Is Held.

The funeral of Mrs. Jane Toles, the oldest pioneer of Elgin County, who died on Monday in Amasa Wood Hospital, St. Thomas, was held yesterday afternoon from the residence of her grand-daughter, Mrs. G. A. Barnes, St. Thomas. The funeral, which was of a private nature, was attended by many relatives from all over Western Ontario, and the services were conducted by Rev. Judson Kelly, of London. Interment was made in St. Thomas Mausoleum.

SNOWBOUND, FRED STONE  
PLEDGES LIFE TO CHRIST

NEW YORK, Feb. 28.—While snow-bound in a train in South Dakota Fred Stone, famous and wealthy Broadway comedian, decided to pledge his life and a large part of his income to Christ. Broadway was informed last night, in a telegram from the comedian and the pastor of a Butte, Montana, Methodist church, where Stone made his decision public. He will continue on the stage. Stone bought a Bible at Billings, Mont., and upon arrival at Butte he discussed his decision with the pastor of the church, addressed the Sunday school and announced that one-tenth of his income, estimated at \$125,000, would be given to the church in the future. Besides his salary Stone is a large owner of realty in New York, and has a farm and country home on Long Island. He is 49 years of age.

## DIARY ALSO SEARCHED

Motive For Slaying of Philander-  
ing Contractor Sought.

NEW YORK, Feb. 28.—In the penciled scrawlings in a loosely-kept diary and the contents of daintily perfumed envelopes, District Attorney Glennon, of the Bronx, was searching to-day for a clue to the identity of the murderer of Frederick Schneider, wealthy contractor, whose dead body was found in his automobile on a lonely road in the Bronx early on Monday evening.

Convinced for the moment at least that a jealous woman killed Schneider, a man prone to much philandering, his friends admit, the district attorney is checking over all the acquaintances of the dead man of whom he can hear. In the meantime, Mrs. Anna Buzzi, with whom Schneider had lived for seven years, was held in jail under \$25,000 bond, while the tangle was being unraveled.

The pocket diary, in which Schneider occasionally scribbled notes of occurrences and the names and addresses of social and business acquaintances, and the letters, which he received from women friends, some married, were found in the apartment he occupied with Mrs. Buzzi. None of the letters were made public and only one excerpt from the diary was revealed. It read: "She threatened to throw hot soup in my face to-day—I never heard a female use such vile language."

MARKERS ARRIVED
