Papers Amalgamate

The Topic and The Advertiser of Petrolia have amalgamated, the change taking place Dec. 1st. The proprietors of the new company are Mr. A. W. Ellis and Mr. G. G. Bramhill, the Dominion-Flax Expert. Since the war began five Lambton papers have gone out of business—two in Sarnia, one in Petrolia, one in Oil Springs and one in Courtright. Forest is now the only town in the county with two papers, and the sooner they get together the better for both the town and the owners. Running a local paper is a hazardous proposition these days, especially in a two paper town, and Union in papers as in Governments is the order of the day. The editor of the Topic in his valedictory very tritely says:—

"But here goes—for better or worse.
