East Lambton Teachers' Institute was held at Petrolia, in the Iroquois Theatre, on Thursday and Friday, October 1st and 2nd.

Opening exercises on Thursday morning were conducted by Rev. A. M. Stewart of Petrolia. Robt. J. Henderson gave a report of the Ontario Educational Association held at Toronto during Easter vacation.

It was moved and carried that the fee of \$5.00 be sent to the secretary of O.E.A.

Walter Kelly read the Financial Report for 1924.

Mrs. F. C. Fisher led in community singing. Mr. Fisher rendered splendid violin solos accompanied by Miss Murray pianist. Vocal solos were given by Mrs. E. McLean.

The afternoon session was opened by Rev. Wm. Rathby of Petrolia, President of the Association. Miss Florence E. Edwards, gave an excellent address on the subject "What are we here for?" She dealt very ably with many points bearing on the teaching profession. Miss Francis Barret gave vocal solos.

Dr. G. O. McMillan of Hamilton Normal School addressed the convention on "Power Development in Canada," illustrated with slides. Inspector J. J. Edwards spoke on Entrance Arithmetic. He dealt particularly with the Entrance paper in Arithmetic of 1923.

Thursday evening a splendid banquet was given in Christ church Sunday school room, followed by a splendid program and an address by Dr. McMillan on Bird Migration.

Excellent music was provided during the evening by Miss Murray, Mr. Fisher and Mrs. McLean. Mrs. Fisher was again present and led in community singing. Recitations were ably given by Mrs. Fisher and Rev. R. C. Pitts, vocal solos by Mr. Kirke Evans and Mr. Ed. Fletcher. Also pleasing scout songs by four boy scouts of Petrolia who happened in during the evening. Mr. J. J. Edwards presided during the evening.

Friday morning session was opened by Rev. J. J. Monds.

The Secretary, Walter Kelly, read the report of the nominating committee.

Dr. McMillan again addressed the teachers on the subject "Measuring the Results of Teaching". The teachers then departed in a body for Pt. Huron where they were met at the boat by Port Huron teachers who conveyed them to the different schools of the city, where they were privileged to see the work as it is being carried on in the American schools.
