**Making a Hotbed**

Horset Manure Gives Best Results.—Make Frame Tight to Prevent Escape of Heat.—Use of Flats Advantageous.—Judicious Ventilation and Watering Very Essential.

As spring approaches thought is given to the sowing of seed and developing plants ready for planting in the garden as soon as the ground and weather permit. Plants for this purpose can best be started in the dwelling house, but usually owing to varied temperature and lack of abundant direct sunlight in the average house window the plants are often anything but thrifty.

The hotbed should be started immediately and will be ready to receive seed or plants in about ten days' time. It is wise to select a sheltered southern spot. If a pit has not been made the manure may be piled on the ground first shovelling off any snow that may be there. If a frame six by twelve feet is used it will be necessary to make the hotbed eight by fourteen feet. The manure should be 2-1/2 to 3 feet deep if made at this season.

**HORSE MANURE BEST**

Horset manure with litter in it is the best to use. Fire-raised manure should not be used as it will give little heat. Separate horse manure and pile in heap alongside where the bed is to be made. If the litter is dry sprinkle on some water which will prevent burning out. Do not, however, drench the pile and check fermentation. The object of turning the pile once or twice before making into a permanent bed is to evenly distribute heating parts of the manure; to scatter parts not moist with those that are, and to allow warm gases that form with the first fermentation to escape. Usually one turning is sufficient providing the above requirements are met. This manure should be ready to form into a hotbed in ten days time after piling.

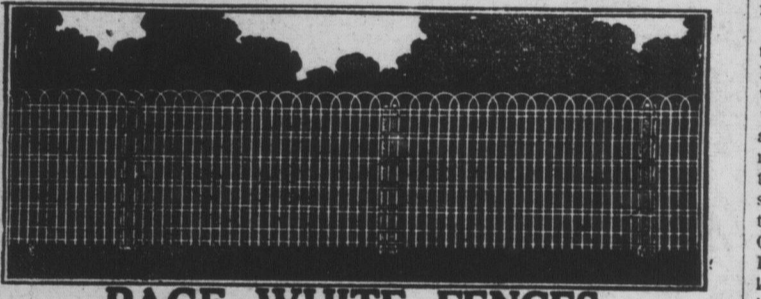
