



bed in flats after they have g?rminat-VENTILATION.

It is necessary to give great care to the ventilation if thrifty plants are to be secured. An even temperature should be maintained of fortyfive to fifty-five degrees for cabbage, cauliflower, lettuce and similar coo season crops. More ventilation should be given during bright days than on dark days, and cold winds blowing

upon the plants chilling them should be avoided especially during April. It is usually advisable to close up the frames in the afternoon as soon as the temperature begins to fall.

Watering should be carefully done, and while the whole of the soil should be moist throughout it is not advisable to have it soaked. 
