NOTES ON ROMANISM.

La Invocation or Baints .- Introduced in the 4th Century. God

The Bee aim I John ii. 1: 1 Tim. ii. 5: 1 Cor. viil. 6.

The Wonsing of Inaces.—Introduced in the year 787. The popes Gregory III., Gregory III., and Zachary, opposed this sin. Pope Constanting Is deposed the Greek Emperor Philip, in the year 713, and put that eyes for setting up images in churches. Gregory III. excommonicated the Emperor Leo IV, for this crime. The present Pope, Pio-Nosis within some of his predecessors, approves of idolatry, and has based a rescript to the Bishop and clergy of Rimini, authorizing them to remainent with a crown of gold a manufactured winking image of the Virgin Mary, and to bonour and venerate with much niets and devo-Virgin Mary, and to honour and venerate with much piety and devo-tion, the said image, on the 15th of August, the day of her supposed examples. God forbids this hin, saying—" Neither shalt thou set up any image which the Lord thy God hatch." Deut. xvi. 22. See also

AIII Invaluation or via Onuncia.—Introduced in the year 1067 by the Second Council of Nice. Popes and council contradict each other, d Romanists cannot agree about the seat of this infallibility. Some less it is the Pope; others in a General Council, and some in the Pope and a General Council. The doctrine is not revealed in the Scriptures.

**Will Avancurant Confession.—Introduced in 1215. God say:

Confess your faults one to another."—James v. 16: but he does not may my where, confess to a priest. See also Exta x. 11: Dan. ix. 4, 18: Lake xv. 18: 19: 1 John i. 8, 9.

**VII-Surramacy or tax Pore.—Introduced in 1215 by the Council of Laterna. Phoese murdered his master the Emperor, and Pope Bonium mayoried him in his treason, for which Phoeas in return conterred that the of Universal Bishop on the Pope. Hence the origin of Papal

Acts xv. 13; 19 VIII. Sair of Industrial - Introduced in the 12th Century. VIII. SAIR OF INDUISEROUS - Introduced to the partition traffic was excessively erandalous in the 16th Century. In the partition and by Tetzel the following words are used - "I absolve three from all thy sins and transgression, how entitions sover they may be " God forbide it..." Who can forgive sine her God only?" Mark it. 7. See also Jeremish i. 20; Issiah ahi: 25; Luke v. 21.

IX. Shavis. Ix Lativ — Introduced in the year 1213. Strange? there never was a decree of Council in favour of this practice; but the fourth of Laseran decreed that divine serves should be in the volgat tongue of every nation. The Aposite Paul says in 1 Cor. xvi. 1), 16-23—" If I pray in an unknown tongue, my understanding is unfruitful." Prayer in an unknown tongue is inconsistent with relact, it is ordained for the improvement of our souls, and an increase of grave.

X. Withholding the Cry face the lasty - Introduced in the year 1415 by the Conneil of Constance Good fothods at lie took the gop and gave thanks, and gave it to them saying, Drink ye all of it. Matt. xxvi. 27; Luke xxvi. 27; I Cor. xt. 25, In the Church of Rome. the cup is not given even to priests unless they difficiete.

XI. Persarrar —Introduced in 1433. This destrice is not even mentioned in the libbs: but God eavs. "The blood of Jesus Christ his Son cleanseth from all sin."—John i. 17; Rev. avt. 13; Recles, ap. 545.

XII. Mariotarry; eg, rue Worsnie of the Virgin Mary. In the year 1558, St. Bonaventure substituted the name of the Virgin for that of God throughout the Penins. In Scripture no mention is made of worship to her; but she, on the contrary, worshipped Christ, saying, "My spirit hath rejoiced in God my Saviour." Lake i. 47. Romanista offer more prayers to her than to Almighty God; and thus commit the growest klolatty.

XIII. SEVEN SACRAMENTS - Introduced as an article of faith in the car 1517, by the Council of Trent. Peter Lembard, a Schoolman of the 12th Century, first mentioned Seven Sacraments. Our Lord instituted only two, Baptism and the Lord's Supper. See Matt. axiii 19; Luke

XIV. Arm gyrnat. Books - The Church of Rome, only in the year 1546 admitted these books into the Sacred Canon of the Council of Trent. They are rejected by the Greek Church, and by the Jews, whose Canon is the same as ours.

XV. PRIMATER INTENTION .- This new error was only established in the year 1548, at Trent. It is growly about d. For instance-if the privat does not intend to baptize, the infant remains a benthen; or, if the intention fail in the celebration of matrimony, the parties, according to the Church of Rome, who fancy themselves married, are firing in fornication.

XVI. VENIAL AND MORTAL SINS.—Introduced in 1563 by the council of Trent. The Bibic draws no such distinction. God says.—"The coul that sinneth, it shall die." Ezek xviii 4. See also Rom. vi. 23;

Cal. iii. 10; James iii; 2; James ii. 10; 1 John til 4.

XVII. SACRIPICE OF THE MASS FOR THE DEAD .- Introduced in the 18th Century, and determined as an sericle of Faith by the Council of Trent. It is contrary to Scripture, for "Christ was once offered to bear the sins of many." See Heb. ix 22-28; vii. vii. 26, 27; and x. 14.— For by one offering he hath perfected for ever them that are sanctified."—Gal. in. 13; 1 John ii. 1, 2.

XVIII. Monastic Institutions.-Convents and Monasteries have no authority in Scripture, for God says. Ye are the light of the world; a city that is set on a hill cannot be hid. Let your light so shine before men that they may see your good works, and glorify your Father which is in heaven."—Matt. v. 14, 15.

XIX. INSUPPLEIENCE OF THE SCRIPTURES AS A RULE OF FAITH.—Re-maniets add Tradition to the Bible as a Rule of faith; but God forbils this addition, Saying.....' In vain do they worship me, leaching for doctrines the commandments of men." Matt. vii. 7. To the law and to the testimony, if they speak not according to this word, it is because there is no light in them." Iss. vifi, 20. See also Tim. III, 16 17; Isa, xxxiv. 16.
