The windows, eight in number, are gothic, and the pews are polished ash with cherry trim-mings. The pullit or rather desk, stands on a raised half circular platform, carrieted in red Brussels and an inside porch will obviate all inconvenience from draughts in winter. The cost has been twelve hundred dollars. At cleven a.m. the church was comfortably filled by the French congregation. Rev. C. A. Doudiet conducted the first service and dedicate the edifice by solemn prayer.
