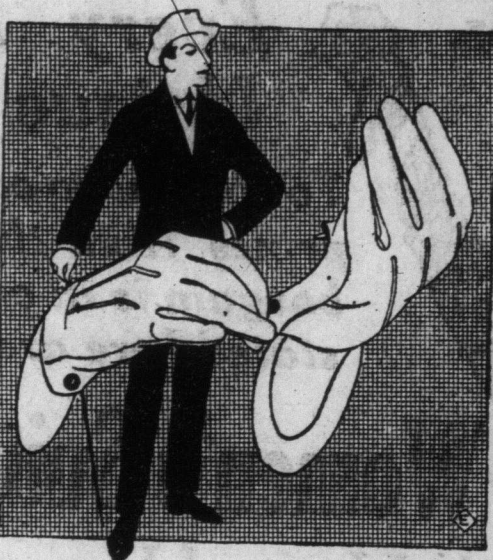

ATLANTA, Ga., April 3.—(Can. Press)—The first of the Leafs' important exhibition games on tour was played here this afternoon with the Atlanta team and resulted as last, in a defeat by 8 to 3. 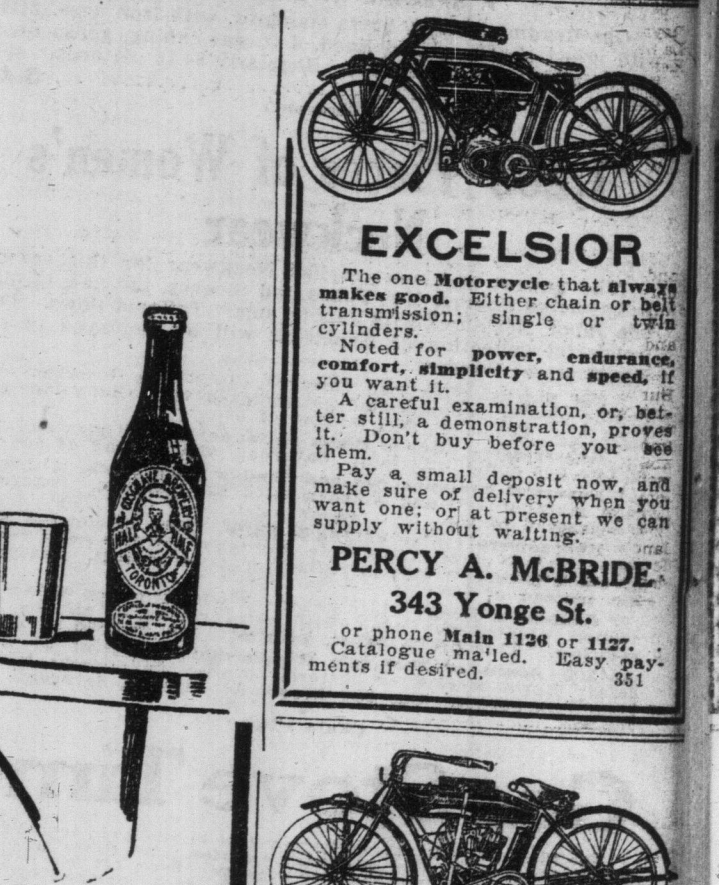
