Many delegates are of the opinion that placing a charge upon the guarantees of truth would be a profitable source of revenue for carrying on the work of the "honesty foremost" campaign. Others, however, believe that to place a charge upon the seals would be commercializing the advertising profession—"penalized honesty."
