to Russia. The great trouble has been lack of transportation facilities. In 1913, out of \$2,145,000 worth of exports sent to Russia, no less than \$2,017,560 worth went thru the United States. While eighteen foreign ships brought 69,465 tons of merchandise from Russia to Canadian ports, there was not one vessel that left a Canadian port-bound for Russia. 
