anxious to protect and strengthen them. We propose to enable your Lordships to exercise your high privileges, consistently with the legitimate rights of the People, and the real interests of the State. We do not permit even the smallest jewel

rights of the People, and the real interests of the State. We do not permit even the smallest jewel to be extracted from the Crown—bu' we add to its grace and lustre. We secure to the Monarch the undisturbed enjoyment of all his dignities and prerogatives, sustained and cherished by the love of an affectionate people—and on them we propose to confer the noblest gift which can be presented to Freemen—the power of choosing Representatives, in whom is vested the maintenance of their properties, rights, and liberties.
