

“ of Cornwall to the crown; for the suppression of  
 “ certain unnecessary offices now belonging thereto,  
 “ for the ascertainment and security of tenant and  
 “ other rights; and for the sale of certain rents,  
 “ lands, and tenements, within or belonging to the  
 “ said dutchy; and for applying the produce  
 “ thereof to the public service.”

But some objections being made by the sur-  
 veyor general of the dutchy concerning the  
 rights of the Prince of Wales, now in his mino-  
 rity, and Lord North remaining perfectly silent,  
 Mr. Burke, at length, though he strongly con-  
 tended against the principle of the objection, con-  
 sented to withdraw this last motion for the *pre-  
 sent*, to be renewed upon an early occasion.
