Home Market Made Them Prosperous.

It is perhaps not possible to make a tariff quite satisfactory to every community, every interest and every individual; but, rightly considered, our tariff has come pretty near to this. Has Done Good Service.

The walking beam of an English ironworking establishment speaks eloquently of the thoroness of the old machine builders. It began work in 1854 with a cylinder of four by eight feet, and a speed of fourteen revolutions per minute under a steam pressure of thirty pounds per square inch. In 1898, it was compounded, the pressure being increased to 120 pounds. In 1910 it was found to be still too valuable a servant to retire, and it was converted into a triple-expansion engine, which now works with steam at a pressure of 20 pounds superheated to 430 degrees. Some years ago the engine "ran away," acquiring such speed as to burst the ropedrive pulleys, yet was very 'little damaged.—Newark News.
