# UNIAN EQUALED WORLD'S RECORD AT CLEVELAND

Track Was Not as Fast as Usual—  
The Limit, Favorite, Won  
the 2.05 Pace.

CLEVELAND, Aug. 8.—Unian, the champion trotting gelding, owned by C. G. Billings of New York, equaled the world's trotting record to date, winning the mile in 2 minutes flat. Consensus that were not exactly favorable to the breaking of the record established by Lou Dillon at Memphis, Tenn., on Oct. 8, 1928, when he did the mile in 1:58. The track was not as fast as usual. A light breeze also tended to hamper him.

Mr. Billings drove the gelding. When he started his charge past the three-mile pole in 1:30 the immense crowd present felt sure that a record would be broken. For Unian has always been famous for his finishing strength. However, he faltered slightly on the homestretch and when the judges, after a comparison of watches finally announced the time, it was found that a fifth of a second had been lost.

The quarter was timed at .294, the half at .594, and the three-quarters at .894. The attempt was made immediately following the conclusion of the regular program.

The second day's program of Grand Circuit races furnished some splendid sport, particularly in the 2.05 pace, and the 2.05 pace, the latter for the Forest City State of \$2000.

In the 2.05 pace, C the Limit, the favorite, fulfilled expectations by winning, although Hal B. Jr. made him wince hard to do so. Hal B. Jr. won the first heat and came within an ace of taking the second. C the Limit showed wonderful bursts of speed in this heat.

The 2.05 pace for the \$2000 Forest City State, the biggest money event of the day, furnished a big surprise in the upset of Twinkling Dan, the favorite, who had been expected to win. He finished sixth in the first heat and fifth in the second, and was distanced in the final heat.

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Lee Wilson, driven by Dodge, took the lead in the first event of the program. In easy style. Gordon Todd, with Geers handling the reins, was the favorite in the betting, but he broke in the first heat when he appeared to have it won, and Geers, unable to steady, had to take fourth money.
