LABORITES HOPE TO TAKE THE WEST HAMILTON SEAT

Emphatic Criticism of Workingmen's Compensation Bill—Fire Escapes.

HAMILTON, Nov. 6.—(Special)—The Independent Labor Party held an enthusiastic meeting in Labor Hall last night and appointed ward committees for the coming fight for the West Hamilton seat in the provincial legislature.

Considerable time was devoted at tonight's meeting to a discussion of the workingmen's compensation bill, which has so long hung fire in the legislative halls at Toronto.

A large amount of routine business was transacted by the works committee, which met to-night instead of tomorrow night on account of Chairman Wallace's intention of being away from the city.

KILLED BY UNKNOWN MAN

Corner's Jury So Finds in Case of Late W. D. Dick—Detectives Hopeful.

The inquest into the death of J. Walter Dick has been held at the coroner's court with a verdict of death on Oct. 7, as the result of being struck by a man unknown to the jury, at the corner of Toronto and King streets.

Every clue has been followed, but without result. Several times the Toronto police have been called out by their man, but have not had sufficient evidence on which to proceed.

MAIL ROBBERY.
