WHAT THE DOCTORS TESTIFY

Symptoms Were Those of Poisoning by Corrosive Acid.

Deceased Was a Mechanic and Had Been Employed on the Erection of York Street Bridge

His Home Was in Peterboro, Where He Had Just Returned From Visiting His Relatives

His Death Was Made by the Proprietor of the Boarding House on Temperance Street

Joseph Davis, a mechanic, about 25 years of age, and son of Patrick Davis, a boatbuilder in Peterboro, and formerly of Lindsay, succumbed at his boarding house on Temperance street yesterday afternoon about 4 o'clock by taking carbolic acid, which he bought at Bingham's drug store on Yonge street on Wednesday afternoon and duly signed for.

AGGRESSIVE JAPAN.

Trying to Fitch From Pacific Rim the Nicaragua Canal and England May Be Helping Her.

New York, Sept. 2.—A special to The Herald from Washington says: Japan, not content with an interference with President McKinley's Hawaiian annexation policy, now has designs upon the Nicaragua Canal.

According to semi-official reports received here from Nicaragua, the Japanese Government is secretly negotiating with the Diet of the greater republic of Central America, which recently met in Salvador, for the construction of the Nicaragua Canal, independent of and in defiance of the interests and influence of the United States or other nations.

If Japan can encompass it, according to the Nicaraguan advice received here, she would like to obtain the abrogation of all treaty rights possessed by the United States in relation to inter-oceanic trade and the forfeiture of the American canal concession from Nicaragua, and to immediately make a treaty with the Diet of the Greater Republic of Central America, giving her control of the canal route through Nicaragua.

In the negotiations with the Nicaraguan Government, it is being well known that she would not assent to a violation of treaty rights.

It has been suspected in some quarters that England, who has always been anxious to acquire at least a joint control of the canal, might be working in collusion with Japan in the "dickering" with the Diet now understood to be in progress, but nothing has yet come to the surface to indicate that she has encouraged Japan in the move.

BLAP ABOUT BIKE TRADE.

Canadian Wholes Must Pay Duty on Crossing to Detroit.

Windsor, Sept. 2.—The United States customs officials here have received notice that bicycles of Canadian manufacture could cross the line only on payment of the duty imposed by the Dingley bill on foreign merchandise.
