### CANADA LIFE ASSESSMENT.

Appeal to be Taken Against the Award of the Three County Judges.

### H., G. & B. AND GRIMSBY SETTLE

Hamilton, Feb. 19.-(Special.)-Mayor Dewar, at the request of Assessment Commissioner Hall, has instructed City Solicitor Mackenzie to appeal the decision of the Board of County Judges in the Canada Life Company case. The department assessed the company on \$316,000 income, and the judges reduced this to \$227,000. The Commissioner Hall is of the opinion the judgment is not correct, and wants the decision of the Court of Appeal. In this award, the three County Judges-Salder of Wentworth, Hamilton of Hutton and Hardy of Brant- were unanimously agreed.

That is Why American Locomotive Builders Got Heavy Orders From the Old Country. The New Ambassador to Britain Dined at the Union League Club in New York.

HE EXPECTS A WARM WELCOME. Americans Have Had a Standfast Friend From the Beginning in the British Queen.

New York, Feb. 18.-A farewell dinner was given at the Union League Club last night to Joseph H. Choate, the newly appointed Ambassador to England. Among the guests were: Governor Roosevelt; Governor Leitch; Attorney General Cass; Senator Sherman; Attorney General McKim; Senator Haman; Congressman Benjamin B. O'Dell; Col. Le Grand B. Cannon, General Grenville M. Dodge; General Benjamin F. Tracy and Judge E. T. Bartlett.

Mr. Choate, in the course of his speech, said: "I believe that never before since the great constitution to establish justice under the laws of the United States, and to promote the general welfare, to secure the blessings of liberty to ourselves and posterity, and to bind ourselves and our children to the same, have we ever had a more hearty and more cordial greeting from a foreigner, and one who is so well known to the people of the United States, than that which has been extended to me by the British people, and also from the English Government, from what I have read or heard, that the English people have never in their history been so friendly to the people of America."

Everything in Common. "God has made of one blood these two mighty nations. Of common origin, of common language, of common literature, the English Bible and the common law have bound the hearts of these two nations together in such a union that no rivalry of interests, no prejudices of politics on either side, have ever permanently impaired it. And though I want to say, what I believe from the bottom of my heart to be absolutely true, and that is that in every part and venerable woman who, after more than thirty years of sovereignty, still reigns supreme in the hearts of her people, Americans from the beginning have found a steadfast and faithful friend."

Now, it is true that this vast and earnest friendship, which has found and is finding every day an abundant expression on both sides of the Atlantic, is not going to change the course of human events or to prevent the nations from making their own hills, after all. It cannot but be that rivalry, and possibly some day, some day, these well-wishers of friendship, which have been so long and so friendly, will be settled by peaceful arbitration, and never again, I trust, by resort to arms."

himself a personal friend of M. Loubet, who, as Mayor, County Councilor, Deputy and Senator, has been a constant and a warm friend of the public. Obliging to his neighbors, he was as accessible as General Grant or Lincoln was, and was less unapproachable.

His thick-set figure, massive and somewhat Roman, though almost bald, indicates a steady, sturdy character, who can hold his colors to the last, but only fights when there is good occasion.

He belonged, under the Empire, to the Republican party, then calling itself Liberales, and was elected county councillor in 1871, then Mayor, and in 1876 was elected to the Chamber of Deputies, where he sat between MM. Henry and Martin, the two famous, accepting of course, the responsibility of the scheme to declare the Republic, and to reconquer Gambetta.
