TWENTIETH YEAR Senate Rag Room

GALLERIES ARE CROWDED.

Mr. McCarthy of North Simcoe in His Maiden Speech Lectures the Old Timers

Ottawa, April 6.—(Special.)—It would naturally be supposed that the twelfth day of the debate on the address would find the interest. In it flagging and the speeches getting dull and monotonous and totally lacking in flavor, but this is not the case. The galleries have been well filled and both of to-day's sittings and the House this afternoon was one of the largest of the session. This evening the House was rather thin, when Mr. Maxwell resumed the debate, as there were several dinners on, but about 11 it began to fill up and there was quite a large attendance on both the Government and Opposition benches. This been an interesting day. Besides Dr. Montague, Hon. Mr. Prior and Mr. John Ross Robertson spoke on the Opposition side, and Rev. Mr. Maxwell and Mr. Campbell in support of the Government.

Mr. Leighton McCarthy also made his malden speech and created quite a favorable impression. He practically repeated what he had stated during his election campaign, as to the independent position he proposed assuming, and said quite modestly that while he did not belong to either party, or even to third party, the side of the House on which his uncle had sat was good enough for him.

Mr. Prior Continues the Debate.

Hon. Mr. Prior, in resuming the debate on the address in reply to the speech from the throne, said it had been suggested to him by a friend that in speaking he should try to rise to the Imperial standard, that is, to speak ten minutes and say something. (Laughter.) He was afraid he would have to take more than ten minutes as there were so many things to say. The member for Guysboro' (Fraser) had last night attempted to answer the able arguments of the member for Halifax (Borden), but he had utterly failed to do so although he had "put more vehemence than ever into his muscular contortions." Laughter.)

2. That this board hearthy concurs in the resolution passed by the Winnipeg Grain and Produce Exchange, that the evils resulting from the mixing of Manitoba grain at Fort William and other terminal elevators are injuriously affecting the reproduction of Manitoba's grain in European markets, and further be it resolved, that this board hereby expresses its positive conviction that no mixing of wheat should be permitted in cargo shipments unless the inspection certificate issued therefore shall have written across its face a statement defining the various grades entering into its composition, and no mixed catgo shall carry straight grade certificate.

3. That the present system of paying the official inspectors at Winnipeg and Fort William by fees is most undesirable; Therefore, be it resolved, That this

Fort William by fees is most undesirable;
Therefore, be it resolved. That this board ask the Minister to cause this fee system to be at once discontinued and that instead thereof inspectors and assistants be paid salaries.

We further would respectfully suggest that inspectors' salaries should be fully commensurate with the important responsibilities of their positions.

Be it resolved, That this board is convinced that they have now arrived at the time when it is absolutely necessary in the interests of the producer and the grain interest generally, that all grain grown in Manitoba and the Northwest Territories passing Winnipeg to Fort William, or south or east thereof, be inspected at Winnipeg and warehoused at Fort William or other eastern elevators on Winnipeg inspection.

A Test Case Regarding the Claims of a Discharged Employe on

the Superanquation Fund. Detroit, April 6 .- A test case of interest Railroad Company was partially tried before Justice Degaw this morning. Charles H. Hunter, former city district ticket agent for the Grand Trunk in Detroit, sues the company for receivery of \$183. This sum represents deductions of 2½ per cent. of his salary which have been made monthly since about 1800 and paid into the Grand Trunk Railway of Canada Superannuation and Provident Fund Association, with head quarters at Montreal. The purpose of the present action is to test the right of the company to do this. To draw anything from the fund an employe of the company must have been in its service until he is 55 years of age. Then he receives an aunual allowance for the remainder of his life count to one-sixteenth of his then salary. Mr. Hunter was released by the company some months ago and is thereby barred from ever realizing anything on the money paid into the association, he not having reached the age of 55.
