The contrivance consists of a long made out of stout canvas and long enough to reach from the top window of the building to the ground. 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PATIENTS ARE ISOLATED.

Isolation Hospital at the Junction Has Now Been Opened on Utley-Street.

SUSPECTS IN BOARDING HOUSE.

Weston Schools Will Take No Chances Till the Danger From Contagion is Over.

Toronto Junction, Feb. 13.—The smallpox patients were this morning moved to the Isolation Hospital on Utley-street, which is situated a reasonable distance from the other dwelling, and far from the centre of the town. The Taylor boarding house, which contains the suspects, who, if no new cases develop, will be allowed out after the prescribed number of days. The house will then be thoroughly disinfected. The High School and Public Schools were today closed, and the Health Inspector and members of the Board of Health are assiduously in seeing that every precaution is taken to prevent any further spread or outbreak of the disease. Now that all the patients are in an isolated spot, the air breathes freer, and the scare is gradually dying out.
