GREAT BRITAIN'S SERIOUS PROBLEM

How to Straighten Up Matters in Vancouver—Japan Ignores Ottawa.

London, Sept. 10.—Officials of the colonial and foreign office realize that a most serious problem has arisen in Vancouver, particularly as the feeling appears to be strongest against the subjects of Great Britain's eastern ally, and that will require most careful handling, for whatever action is taken is likely to be resented either by the colony or by Japan.

Anti-Japanese legislation by British Columbia was discussed at length during the recent visit of the colonial Premier in London, Australia, being much opposed to the admission of Asiatics as are the Canadians. No steps were taken at the time, however.

All the cabinet ministers are out of town at present, but the colonial and foreign office officials are seeking to obtain all the information possible, with the view of taking some action, the nature of which is difficult to surmise.

Vancouver, Sept. 10.—There was no reaction yesterday from the fever of public feeling which culminated on Saturday night in a mob attack on the Oriental quarter of the city. Today the wrecked section presents a dreary appearance. The interiors of the shops are littered with costly china, silks, teas and spices worth thousands of dollars. Few of the Chinese have returned, but the Japs are there, indignant and ready to fight.

That K. Ishii, the Japanese envoy, who arrived in the city during the fiercest part of the rioting, and was close to the storm center, regards the situation as serious from an international point of view, is indicated by the numerous cables he has sent and received from Tokyo.

There has been no attempt on the part of Mayor Bethune to patch the matter up either with the Japanese envoy or the consul, and his emphatic declaration that under no circumstances would he submit to the proposition that the city pay the damages, now variously estimated at from fifty to one hundred thousand dollars, sustained by the shops and buildings of the Japs and Chinese wrecked, is accepted as a definite expression of his sentiment.

Some feeling followed developments, showing that Secretary A. E. Fowler, of the Japanese Anti-Asiatic League, from Seattle, who attended the meeting to protest against the Orientals, at which the riots started, and used intemperate language in detailing to the excited crowd how the Orientals at Bellingham had been treated.

The most serious aspect of the question is the approaching of several shiploads of Orientals, due to arrive this week. In the state of public excitement it is feared the riots will break out afresh.

During the five hours of the street fighting no arrests could be made, as the prisoners were dragged from the officers by the infuriated mob. Later a score were quietly picked up. Little importance is attached to the burning in effigy of Lieutenant-Governor Duns-muir because of the well-known hatred entertained for him by labor leaders.

The news of the riots in Vancouver awakened great uneasiness among the Orientals in Victoria. Mass-meetings of the Chinese were held to consider the situation, and throughout the day messages were passing between Orientals in both cities. The Japanese colony has been in communication with Consul-General Nosse here, who will communicate with his Government, which will, in turn, place the matter in the hands of its ambassador at London.

laborers for Vancouver. It is thought they will be landed at Victoria in view of the belligerent attitude which Vancouver is assuming.
