Boilermaker of Old London Made World's Rivet Driving Record

LONDON, May 8.—The record made recently by Charles Schock, who at Baltimore drove in 2,729 rivets in nine hours, has been beaten in London. The workmen of Fraser & Fraser, engineers and boilermakers, asked the management to give them an opportunity of beating Schock's record, and the effort was made yesterday by a picked squad under Robert Farrant, aged 31. He is a family of eighteen, and his father, aged 61, is a riveter in the same yard. The yard set out to do 2,500 rivets in nine hours, so as to beat Schock's figure, but Farrant passed that total in six hours. Going on, he hammered in 4,267 rivets in nine hours, an average of slightly less than 45 an hour, or one rivet every 7 1/2 seconds. This is claimed to be a world record.
