> The Annual Report Says War Claims 20.3 Per Cent of Total Incurred.

Ottawa, Oct. 16.—That' life insurance companies in Canada were affected by war mortality to a much greater extent than previously is shown in the annual report of the superintendent of insurance just issued by the department of finance. During the year 1916 the forty-five insurance companies doing business in Canada experienced war claims to the amount of \$4,560,938, as compared with total war ckaims in the preceding two years of \$1,571,150. The comparative importance of these claims will be realized when it is observed that the total death claims incurred during the war amounted to \$17,395,816, so that the war claims have been approximately 20.3 per cent of the total claims incurred.

More Policies Taken.

Notwithstanding the difficulties arising out of the war, the total amount of policies in Canada taken during the year 1916 was \$231,101,625, which is greater than the amount taken in 1915 by \$9.982,667. The Canadian companies, which number 26, show an increase in 1916 of \$17,167,971, as compared with a decerase of \$476,680, whilst in 1915 they had a decrease of \$4,76,680, whilst in 1915 they had a decrease of \$4,567,777. The ten American companies operating in this country, on the other hand, show a decrease in the amount of policies taken of \$6,709,224. In 1915 they had an increase of \$12,352,333.

The amount of new fife insurance taken by Canadian companies exceeds that taken by British, colonial and United States companies by \$45,300,937. The detailed figures are as follows:

Canadian companies, \$138,201,231;
British and colonials, \$5,250,633; United States, \$87,649,711.

The total amount of insurance in force in Canada, according to the report is \$1,422,179,632. Claims terminated by death, etc., during 1916 totalled \$27,292,903, and by surrender or lapse \$104,172,-247 or a decrease of \$32,209,582 as compared with the previous year.
