At the outbreak of war Britain possessed 10,000 ships. Addition of the fishing fleet brought the number to Three hundred thousand British and foreign sailors manned these ships, of which 15,000 have paid the supreme penalty of courage opposed by superior force and diabolical methods of warfare. Thrice that number of widows and children are the poorer for the loss of their breadwinners.




