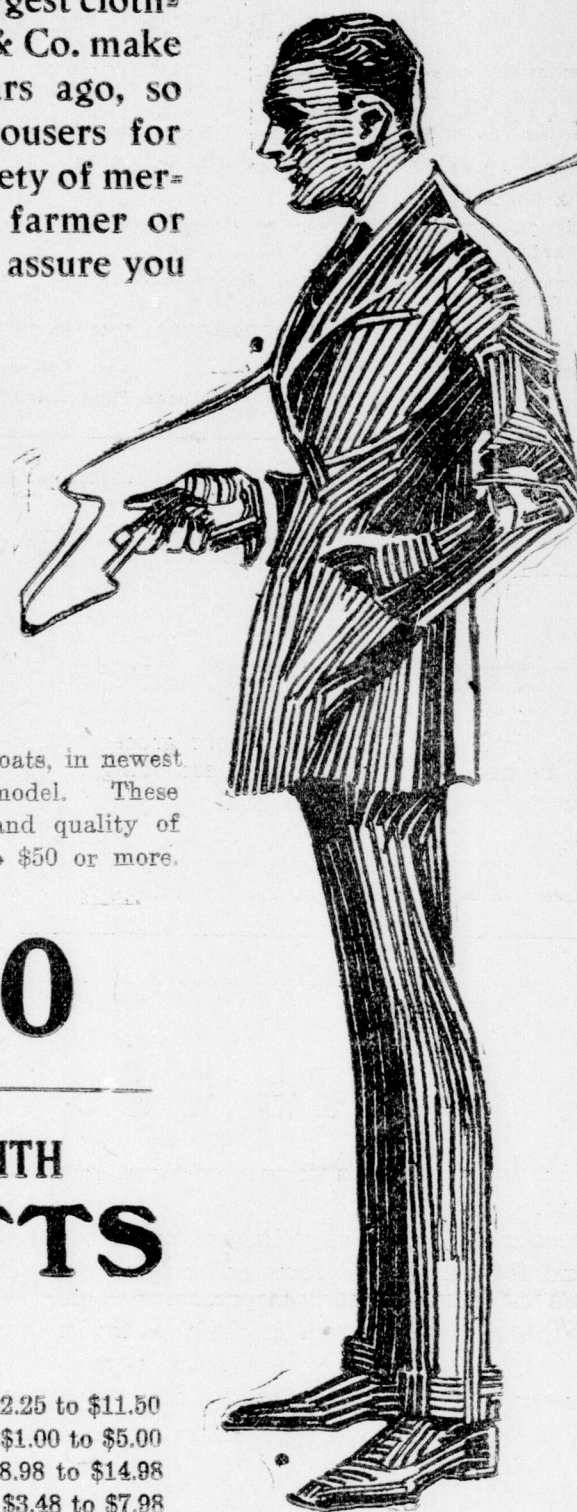

TWO WIRES CARRY FORTY TELEGRAMS SIMULTANEOUSLY

Five Telephone Conversations
Transmitted at Once.

REMARKABLE INVENTION

Both Telephone and Telegraph Messages May Go
Over Same Wires.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 12.—Postmaster-General Burleson today made public a letter from Theodore N. Vail, president of the American Telephone and Telegraph Company, announcing the invention and development by the technical staff of the Bell system of a "practical system of multiplex telephony and telegraphy by the use of which it is now possible to increase many fold the message carrying capacity of long telephone and telegraph wires."

operated, each giving services as good as that provided by the circuit working in the ordinary way. "The nature of these developments is such that, if desired, wires may be used partly for telephone and partly for telegraph. A pair of wires is available either for five simultaneous telephone conversations or for forty simultaneous telegraph messages, or partly for one and partly for the other. "From the nature of the apparatus and the methods employed, the system is not practically advantageous on short lines, either telephone or telegraph. On long lines its application will be extended immediately, but its introduction must necessarily be gradual on account of the nature of the apparatus required, and rearrangement and adaptation of the lines themselves, and their associated apparatus, to the new methods of working. It is not too much to characterize this new system as marking an epoch in the development of long-distance telephony and telegraphy."

**MONEY SENT TO CANUCK
TROOPS OVERSEAS SHOULD
BE BY POSTAL ORDER NOW**

OTTAWA, Dec. 12.—The public is reminded by the postoffice department that remittances to members of the Canadian army corps now advancing into Germany should be made by means of postal notes, which may be obtained at any postoffice, and not as formerly by means of postoffice money orders, which were cashed at French civil post-offices. The change in the method of making remittances to members of the Canadian army corps is necessitated by the change in location of the corps. Arrangements have been made through the British postal authorities whereby there will be no difficulty whatever on the part of the members of the Canadian army corps in having those cashed at any field postoffice.

U.S. PREPARES TO EXPOSE GERMANS' SABOTAGE SYSTEM

Voluminous Documents Have
Been Assembled by Justice
Department.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 12.—Voluminous documents shedding light on the German system for blowing up munition factories and practicing sabotage and espionage in various forms have been assembled by the department of justice in preparation for disclosure, it was said today, but officials have not determined what portion of these it would be wise to give out, or when it might be done without interfering with activities of Government agents still in progress.
