

CABINET SPLIT **OVER RENEWING RUSSIAN TRADE**

British Government Believes Soviet Will Pay Russian Debts.

LONDON, Nov. 17 .- The cabinet today held a long session, again discussing the question of the opening of trade relations with Soviet Russia. Premier Lloyd George, Andrew Bonar Law and other members of the cabinet were understood to be pressing for resumption against the opposition of Earl Curzon, the foreign secretary; Winston Churchill, the secretary of war, and Austin Chamberlain, the chancellor of the exchequer, who fear it would be difficult to enforce the provision in the proposed agreement that the Boisheviki should not attempt propaganda against Great Britain.

They desire to meet again with Leonid Krassin, the Soviet representative, and endeavor to get from him further assurances on the propaganda question. It is reported the Russians will agree to recognize Russian debts ing the question of the opening of question.
