### DOUKHOBORS ON PARADE INNOCENT OF CLOTHING

Magistrate Falling Sentences the  
Lot to Six Months—They  
Come to Toronto.

FORT WILLIAM, April 9.—Six months was the sentence handed out by Magistrate Felling this afternoon to 19 of the local Doukhobors who this morning attempted to hold another parade, devoid of any wearing apparel, and were stopped by the police before they got up town.

The prisoners were found guilty of committing an indecent act in public. The sentence is to be put in by the men at the Central Prison, Toronto, and by the women at the Mercer, Reformatory.

The parade and arrests of the pilgrims this morning was very dramatic and an immense crowd of curious citizens viewed the spectacle of the 19 arrests. Nine were women and ten were men. The prisoners all took their arrests in a calm manner and continued their weird dirge through the entire proceedings.

### NEW ACTING DETECTIVES.

Five Appointments Which Go into Effect To-day.

By an order of the chief of police issued yesterday five new acting detectives assume duties in various police divisions to-day.

This follows upon the appointment of three of the previous acting men as full-fledged detectives and giving a special man to each of divisions 5 and 7 in the north and west, which have heretofore been in the hands of one Harry Armstrong, who has been doing plainclothes duty in No. 1 division, is now acting detective in that division.

David McKelvey continues as acting detective in No. 3 division, and Robert Moffatt in No. 3 division.

In No. 4 division P.C. Oxlend (82) is appointed out of the ranks of that division. P.C. Miller (17), attached to No. 2 division, will be acting detective in No. 5, and P.C. George P. Dickinson (34) will be acting detective in No. 6, from No. 3 division.

P.C. Mahoney from No. 7 division will be acting detective there.

All of these men are young and energetic.

WANT CONTRACT DEFINED.

Stratford Council Passes Resolution on Power Question.

STRATFORD, April 9.—(Special.)—The city desires some changes in the hydro-electric contract. At least it would appear so from the following resolution passed in the following meeting: "That the city solicitor be instructed, in acting with the solicitors of other cities, to satisfy himself that the interests of municipalities are adequately guarded in the proposed contract with the hydro-electric power commission, and to advocate the insertion of provisions with regard to obligations toward initial expenses of municipalities joining the scheme at later periods securing to municipalities control of their local market both against invading producers and the commission itself; a declaration as to reduction to initial municipalities after the transmission line is paid for and the use of said line, including the guarantee that the cost of power to Stratford shall not exceed a rate of \$24.50, as voted on here, and the commission be declared to be trustees for the municipalities paying for the transmission line."

After Good Roads System.

The county council to-day decided to raise \$20,000 for a good roads system. A delegation from Tavistock applied for incorporation and it was recommended that such be granted under certain conditions.

### BOARD OF HEALTH PLANS FOR SMALLPOX HOSPITAL

Assessment Commissioner Requested to Take a Census of Children of a School Age.

HAMILTON, April 9.—(Special.)—At the finance committee meeting this evening Ald. Nicholson asked Mayor Stewart if he had succeeded in getting a full statement of the fund raised by Miss Jeanette Lewis for the Sick Children's Hospital.

The mayor said there were still some accounts outstanding, and he thought the committee should make an examination of the accounts, but he held that he and the other trustees, John Billings, had been appointed only to see that the money turned in by Miss Lewis, was credited to the fund. On the motion of Ald. Dickson and Nicholson, it was agreed to ask the trustees for a statement of the fund up to date, to be handed over to the city auditors for a report.

A sub-committee will meet the Board of Health Council next Saturday to discuss terms of annexation of a district on the mountain, near the head of Wentworth street.

The board of health submitted plans for a \$5000 smallpox hospital. They were requested to submit the tenders received at the next meeting of the committee. On the appointment of two new members of the cemetery board was deferred until next meeting.

Ald. Farrar complained that the assessors were not doing their work satisfactorily, but other aldermen took the opposite view and no action was taken. School Additions.

The board of education this evening endorsed Trustee Allen's scheme to spend \$250,000 on improvements to school property. This year eight-room additions will be made to the Sophia and Pictou-streets Schools. The contracts for the Sophia-street School were let this evening. They total up to \$38,000. Although the board had hoped to do it for \$35,000.

The city council will be asked to issue debentures for \$45,000 to cover the cost of the Sophia-street addition and fire escapes for the Queen Victoria and West-streets Schools.

A resolution was carried recommending to future boards the advisability of re-constructing the Victoria-avenue, Cannon and Murray-streets Schools. New uniforms for the cadets will be bought.

Assessment Commissioner MacLeod was requested to take a census of all children of school age.

A burning oil tank at the Commercial Oil Co.'s premises on West Jackson-street gave the firemen a run this afternoon. The damage was slight.

Canada Life's New Agent.

David Kidd, local agent of the Canada Life, has resigned and will be succeeded by G. D. Burns.

The majority report of the conciliation board says that John Theaker broke various rules of the company, and that his dismissal was fully justified. The board also found that the agreement existed among the men, the company maintained an attitude of strict neutrality between the warring unions. This finding is signed by William Bell, K.C., and Judge Murray.

J. G. O'Donoghue makes a minority report, in which Theaker is vindicated. Theaker was a member of the Street Railwaymen's Union, and has been appointed to a government position since his dismissal by the company.

Hon. Adam Beck, who was expected here to-day, telephoned that he was unable to come to-day, but would be here early next week, to discuss the power scheme with the aldermen.

Fears Son is Dead.

William Lewis, 25 Steven-street, father of Harry Lewis, the missing telegrapher of the Beamsville branch of the Bank of Hamilton, said to-day that he never expected to see his son again, as he believes the youth met with foul play. Lewis left Beamsville for Niagara Falls on March 28, and has not been heard of since. He is about 17 years of age, five feet six inches in height, thick set and stout, and has a boyish expression.

The street railway is buying about a dozen second-hand cars. One of them has arrived. It is equipped with air brakes.

It is claimed that the police knew that some robberies were going to take place in the market hall, and did nothing to prevent them. Chief Smith says there is no foundation for such a charge.

The Brunswick Balke Collender Co. has issued a writ to set aside the deed of the billiard academy, King William-street, from Chas. Alkin to George E. Mills, as giving fraudulent preference. The company has a bill of about \$1000 against the place.

OTTAWA, April 9.—The charge at the assizes before Judge Macneil, wherein three men were indicted for manslaughter in a wreck when the C. P. R. train hit it at a crossing was disposed of to-day.

The death of one Angus Wank, aged last January from the collision, was found by the jury, and the jury found the street car conductor, Ernest Souther, and Motor-man Herman Fligel, not guilty. The judge said the verdict was against the evidence.

### TOT KILLED BY A CAR LITTLE SISTER ESCAPES

Tragedy on Bathurst Street Which  
Costs the Life of Norman  
McKeown.

Standing at the front window of her home at 819 Bathurst-street, but unable to render aid or even give voice to an audible warning, Mrs. Thomas McKeown watched Bathurst-street car No. 1212 crush out the life of her 6-year-old son, Norman, and severely bruise and cut her 4-year-old daughter, Elsie, shortly after noon yesterday. This is the second child life claimed by street cars in that locality within a week.

The car was in charge of Motorist J. Dilton, 17 Saunders-avenue, and Conductor D. Irwin, 33 Turner-street. The children crossed the street behind a northbound car which obscured them from the view of Motorist Dilton, and they, too, failed to observe the southbound car approaching.

The car struck them, going at a fast rate and the children went down. The fender, a self-operating one, failed to work, and Norman was rolled beneath the wheels of the car.

The girl was struck away by the fender.

The boy was carried to Dr. A. J. Harrington's office at 819 Bathurst, but nothing could be done to save his life.

The death was reported to County Crown Attorney Drayton, and Coroner R. J. Wilson opened an inquest last night, which was adjourned till April 15.

### THREE IN FOR THEFT.

Said to Have Burglarized West End Dry Goods Store.

Charged with theft of a quantity of hosiery and cloth, taken from the store of Robert Fawcett, 1512 West-Queen-street, several weeks ago, John Wasey, 21 years, 202 Lisgar-street, a laborer, and Harry Dewberry, 24 years, 119 Dovercourt-road, a laborer, were arrested by Police Constables Cronin and McArthur as 10:30 yesterday morning.

The men are locked up at the Agnes-street Station. Acting upon further information Detective Murray made his first arrest since his promotion to a detective rank. He looked up Harry Wry, 23 years, a bartender at a Yonge-street hotel, at 6:30 in the evening. He also found a quantity of the cloth and hosiery with the theft of which the other men were charged.

The other men are also charged with theft of a quantity of boots from a Junction store.
