AVIATORS BRAVE THE BAD WEATHER

Airmen Do Reconnoitring Work for Infantry Despite the Heavy Rain.

ENGAGE HUN TROOPS. Strong West Wind and Down-pour Disastrous to the British Airmen.

London, Oct. 13.—The following British war office statement concerning aviation activities was issued tonight: "Yesterday the weather could not have been less favorable for the operations of our airplanes with our infantry in their attack. Nevertheless our machines went out until 10 o'clock in the afternoon, both during the rain and in the clear intervals. With great difficulty they succeeded in locating the troop movements of the enemy, and the positions of a great many hostile batteries, and reported their observations to our artillery. In addition to this work more than 10,000 rounds were fired by our airmen with machine guns at hostile infantry in trenches and shell holes on the roads. Parties of mounted troops and the convoys of motor transports also were engaged from low altitudes, causing many casualties to the enemy and great confusion in their ranks. "Only a few German machines were encountered, presumably on account of the bad weather, and little fighting took place in the air. Four enemy airplanes were brought down and five others were driven down out of control. "Ten of our machines are missing. The very strong west wind and the suddenness with which the driving rainstorms came on, accounted for the non-return of many of our airplanes. Several of those missing belonged to patrols that were not engaged in fighting, and evidently were lost in the storms."

PROHIBITORY ORDER FEARED BY BREWERS

Issue Not Really One of Conservation, is Defense Made. Montreal, Oct. 13.—Interviewed today on an Ottawa despatch which said the king's council has before it an order prohibiting the use of grain in Canada by brewers or distillers, Norman Dawes, head of a big brewing combination here, said: "The government cannot possibly be moved by considerations of food conservation in the case of the brewers, but simply by considerations of prohibition."

The barley crop of Canada last year, according to the brewers, was about 60,000,000 bushels. Of this amount the brewers had used about 8,000,000 bushels. "It is hard to imagine," stated Mr. Dawes, "that the government of Canada will not follow the same line in this matter as have been followed by the government of Great Britain and also the government of the United States."

Mr. Dawes stated he was of the opinion that the order forecast in council would be amended so as not to affect the brewers.

ITALIANS REPULSE FOE IN COSTABELLA REGION

Considerable Artillery Firing From Rombo to Sea is Reported. Rome, Oct. 13.—The official statement issued by the Italian war department today said: "Thursday night in the Costabella region an attempted attack by the enemy was promptly crushed. The Italian front our patriots harassed enemy working parties and took prisoners. "There was considerable artillery fire from the Rombo to the sea. On the Carso our batteries dispersed marching detachments of the enemy and destroyed a Castagnavizza and fired an ammunition dump in the San Giovanni region."

Cadet Recovers After Fall Of Four Thousand Feet

Montreal, Oct. 14.—Flight Cadet H. R. Janel of St. Germain, who while flying at Camp Borden on Sept. 1, fell more than 4000 feet as a result of something going wrong with his machine, is in the Royal Victoria Hospital here slowly recovering from concussion and shock. His narrow escape from death has not caused him to give up his aviation course, which he will resume as soon as he is sufficiently recovered, which may be several weeks yet.

Will Class One Provide The One Hundred Thousand Men?

It will be greatly to the advantage of Canada if the entire quota of 100,000 men to be raised under the Military Service Act can be secured from the first class; that is, from the men between the ages of 20 and 34 who were unmarried or widowers without children on July 6th, 1917.

This is almost self-evident for the following reasons: it is admitted that, between the ages of 20 and 34, the average man is at the height of his physical strength and is most adaptable to the change of conditions from civilian life; the military Service of unmarried men and widowers without children would occasion less distress than that of most others, since they are largely without dependents. Also, it would entail less financial burden for Canada, through separation allowances, etc.

Authorities estimate that, after all proper examinations have been allowed, Canada should be able to produce from the first class 100,000 men fit for service, so the drain upon the man power of the country will be less severe.

Members of Class One will be well advised to present themselves for examination immediately to the Medical Board in their district. Upon examination as to their physical fitness, they will be placed in one of the following categories: Category A—if fit for service in overseas fighting units. Category B—if fit for service overseas in Army Medical Corps, Forestry Battalion, etc. Category C—if fit for service in Canada only. Category E—if unfit for military service of any nature.

If not placed in category A, the applicant will know that he is not liable for immediate service, but will go to the Post Office and send in a claim for exemption with his Medical Certificate attached, when he will receive in due course a certificate of exemption until those in his medical category are summoned for service.

Where a man, who is placed in category A, feels that exemption should be allowed, an application form can be secured from the postmaster. This form, when filled in, will be forwarded by the postmaster to the registrar of the district, and the applicant will be informed by mail as to the time and place for the consideration of his application by the Exemption Board.

OFFICER SHAMED GERMAN SNIPERS. Briton Risks Life to Deliver Rebuke to the Unscrupulous Huns.

British Front in France and Belgium, Oct. 14.—The Associated Press correspondent today talked with several wounded stretcher-bearers who came back from Poelcapelle, and from them he heard of a remarkable incident during Friday's battle. They said they operated continually in mud which, at the best, was up to their knees, and in addition were constantly harassed by enemy snipers concealed in shell holes and even in shattered trees.

During the morning German stretcher-bearers had advanced numerous times almost to the British lines to get their own wounded, and had not been molested because of Red Cross flags. Notwithstanding this, the Germans continued firing on the British until the climax was reached. When three stretcher-bearers, working together were shot dead by snipers hidden nearby.

Influriated by this outrage, a British officer seized a Red Cross flag and, waving it over his head, rushed toward the snipers. When he arrived he bitterly denounced their treacherous action, employing as his medium the German language, which he speaks fluently. He called the enemy's attention to their violation of the laws of war and humanity, and

The sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years of age, may homestead a quarter-section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. Applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the District. He must also file a declaration of intention with the Dominion Lands Agency (but not Sub-Agency) on certain conditions. Duties.—Six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each year. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres, on certain conditions. A habitable house is required, except where residence is performed in certain conditions. Live stock may be substituted for cultivation in certain districts.
