Ottawa, March 12.—The Dominion government's tentative proposal, as a revenue-producing measure, to impose a tax of one-half of one per cent, even one per cent, on all sales by retail merchants throughout Canada, when mooted at the meeting of the growers' branch of the Retail Merchants' Association last night, was most unfavorably received.

Members were outright in their denunciation of such a method of "hitchhiking the cost of living," as far as their trade was concerned, and said it would mean a big loss annually to them.

DRURY CABINET **IN TIGHT CORNER**

decided to issue only the form of certificate that was called for by the O.T.A.

Mr. Ferguson insisted upon exact information as to responsibility for the establishment of these warehouses, whether resting with the Dominion or with the province. If with the province he was bound to enquire whether the government had entered upon a system of debauching the country.

Mr. Raney was visibly anxious to let the subject drop when General Hogarth intimated that he proposed returning to it on another occasion. But the house was bursting with curiosity.

Sam Clarke marveled at the import of Mr. Raney's plea of irresponsibility upon the certificate excuse. He could imagine ten thousand premises being made fit for so profitable a business inside of three months.

Mr. Raney: The statute is there and speaks for itself.

Mr. H. Dewar read the statute. He could not see the distinction the attorney-general had drawn. This matter is most important, he said. I think under the section that the board is given the distinct power of creating these privileges. We could have an explanation from the government as to what the license board considers its power. Is the board merely a rubber stamp?

Mr. Raney: We act strictly by the statute in issuing certificates.

Mr. Dewar: I do not expect a quibble from the attorney-general. Does he mean that anybody can obtain a certificate? Or is the board under no obligation to refuse a certificate?

Mr. Raney: I can conceive the board refusing when the premises are unfit.

A Specific Case.
 Mr. Ferguson cited information of a specific case conveyed to him upon this head. The licensed importer application to the board had first been refused, but afterwards something happened and it was granted. Was that true or why?

Mr. Nixon was about to reply, but Mr. Raney stepped into the breach again and explained that the Hudson Bay Company, which was the first applicant, had been refused a certificate, but upon representing that it had made large commitments in regard to purchases of liquor, had been granted a certificate. We could along a large number of others explaining that the Hudson Bay Company had been granted a monopoly so in order to show that the board had been favorably treated. They were likewise granted similar certificates.

Mr. Ferguson: The boys seem to have got wise somehow. (Laughter.) Mr. Raney deplored that the O.T.A. seemed to have faults as well as benefits.

Mr. Ferguson: But you owe it a debt of gratitude for providing you with a seat. (Laughter.) He pressed again for a straight answer without these privileges were granted without restraint or restriction. If so named the minister of public works instead of building the provincial boulevards to Kenora. (Laughter.)

Sam Clarke was amazed at what he heard. He had thought the Hearst government had been a great deal for them. (Laughter.) But the innocent attorney-general setting into motion the machinery of the O.T.A. from low and to do the old government for God's sake, said Mr. Clarke to Mr. Raney, don't ever again copy anything they did. (Laughter.)

LEGISLATURE NOTES

Answering a question, Premier Drury said the report of the civil service commission will be brought down next week.

The premier said \$89 applicants are in the field for the position of provincial treasurer, some from the O.T.A. but not yet been appointed, nor has it been decided to what department he will be attached.

Premier Drury told Howard Ferguson the appointment of a civil service commission is under consideration.

Mr. Raney stated that J. C. Elliott was appointed March 11 to advise and assist the government in regard to legislation. His salary has not been decided. He had simply been retained.

The premier said, the Chairman Englehart had resigned from the T. & N. O. for the former government, and Geo. Lee was appointed to the position. Lee was not before the present government, because Mr. Englehart is ill. Both officials are in office pending a reorganization.

Captain Tom Magladeroy was informed that no negotiations have taken place for the sale of the T. & N. O. to the Dominion.

Hon. F. C. Biggs presented quite a long statement of statistical information as to motors and trucks in the service of the government, of which six are used by ministers of the crown.

Hon. Mr. Raney's partnership bill is identical with the statute in force in the United Kingdom, and is in effect a codification of the Ontario law of partnership.

There is before the legislature a bill that would extend the hours of voting from 8 a.m. to 8 p.m.

Major Tolmie will find out what quantity of liquor passed thru the hands of government liquor vendors for each month, separately, from Sept. 1, 1919, to March 1, 1920.

J. W. McLeod will inquire how many persons are employed in the management of the Ontario temperance act, including the board of license commissioners, the amount of salaries or other remuneration, and total cost to date of the enforcement of the O.T.A.

Mr. Pinard is asking a good deal of O.T.A. information.

Lt. Stover will probe the shrewdness of Algoma and the manner in which recommendations were made to fill it.

Sam Clarke would have the authority under which Hon. H. Mills has so far abolished the move of Trustee Lane last year, have had their hopes revived. Miss Colter will introduce a motion at the next meeting of the board for the reintroduction of the bill in the school. Trustee Lane is no longer a resident of the city.
