



Record made in 50 h.r. Machine on
Seven Lap Track at Florida
Races.

Orangewood, Fla., Jan. 30.—H. W. Fletcher, in an 80-horse-power automobile, to-day won the 100-mile race in 78 minutes and 24 seconds. The race, which was the first of the season, is believed to be the time made will stand as a world's record for some time.

Ten cars lined up for the start, which was at the 2-mile point. "Mogotto" led the bunch, and the others were made, then back and forth between the 14-mile stretch left. The first lap was made in 12 minutes and three and a half laps, finishing the last three back to the 2-mile point, and the first three back to the 14-mile point, leaving the last three in the following order:

Arthur E. Johnson, driving his 80-horse-power; A. Leblanc, driving his 80-horse-power; and H. W. Fletcher, driving his 80-horse-power. After the first lap, driving W. G. Bond, broke a 50-horse-power; Paul W. Bond, driving his 50-horse-power; William Wall, driving his 50-horse-power; and H. K. Keller's 50-horse-power; Samuel L. Stevens, driving his 50-horse-power; and H. K. Keller's 50-horse-power.

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The speed averaged by Fletcher was 47.25 seconds per mile, much less than in slowing up during the last lap.
