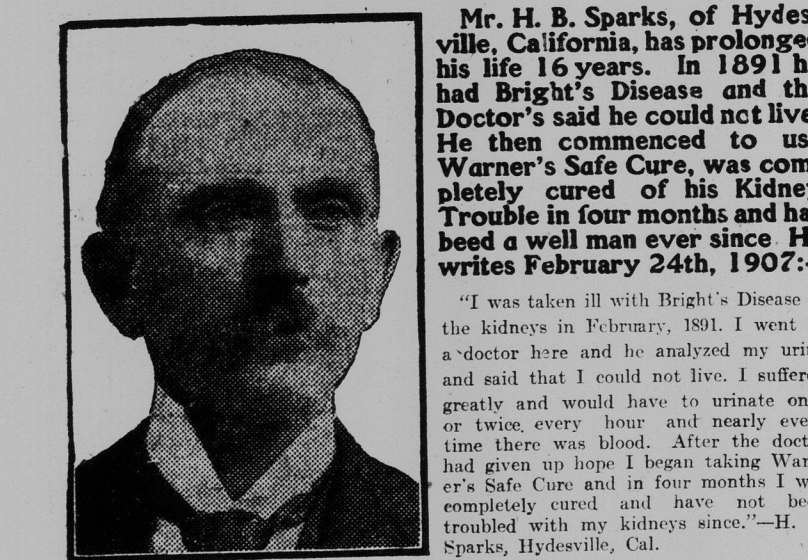

TO RESTRICT POWER OF HOUSE OF LORDS

London, June 14—The following is the text of the resolution on the subject of the house of lords which Premier Campbell-Bannerman will move in the house of commons June 24:

"That in order to give effect to the will of the people, as expressed by their elected representatives, it is necessary that the power of the house of lords should be restricted by law so as to secure that within the limits of a single parliament the final decision of the house of commons shall prevail."

HE WON \$50,000 MERELY TO IMPRESS HIS BRIDE

Just to Show Her That His Horses Can Run R. L. Thomas Makes New York Bookmakers Sad.

NEW YORK, June 14—Bookmakers at Gravesend received one of the drawings of their lives just because a bridegroom wanted to show his bride how well his horses could run. Robert L. Thomas, a wealthy Kentucky horseman, who was married at Washington on Saturday, had two winners out of the seven contests on the card, and with one of them and over \$50,000 and with the other enough to make it an even \$50,000. Adding to that the sums his friends at the track and other bettors in cities where there are poolrooms added to their bank accounts, it was one of the largest "killings" of recent years.

Although not a breeder, Mr. Thomas is an extensive owner of horses in training. The records give his stable as having about twenty-four horses. His home is near Lexington and he is a newsmonger on the metropolitan track. In Washington last Saturday Mr. Thomas married Miss Irma Trent, known to her friends as "Dimples," and they came to New York for their honeymoon. As the bride was to visit the race track yesterday, the bridegroom directed his trainer to enter at least two of his best handicap horses in overnight events and to send them to the post ready to win.

John Ireland elected Wexford, a brown gelding, five years old, for one of the contests, and Harcourt, a two-year-old bay colt, for the other. Wexford was entered in the third race, which was a handicap for three-year-olds and upwards, at a mile and a furlong. Harcourt went into the five and one-half furlong dash, which was down as the sixth race.

Wexford had previously started in the east twice this season and his work had not impressed any but a few experts. In his first race he was next to last in a field of ordinary selling placers and in his other race he was last. But on that occasion at Belmont Park, he showed in front for a time with a flash of speed. He was bumped into coming into the stretch and quit. The Herald chart made mention of this fact.

Wexford had better company yesterday than he has ever had. There was Zamboni, Tommy Waddell, Far West, Red Friar, Flavius and Temacoe. All gave him weight and even this did not attract at the race track yesterday. Flavius and Temacoe were scratched and Zamboni was made a pronounced favorite.

Out of all the handicappers of the city only one, the Rossan system, presented Wexford as a winner. He accounted at 15 to 1.
