MARKET PRICES ON UPGRADE IS N.Y. REPORT

Active Short Covering Took Place in Motor Group

TRADING ON MONTREAL EXCHANGE IS ACTIVE

2,350 Shares of Steamship Change Hands in Half Hour

NEW YORK, May 21.—Stock prices made further recovery at the opening of today's stock market. Active short covering again took place in the motor group in further reflection of the increase in the regular Hudson dividend and the declaration of a twenty per cent. stock dividend. Initial gains of a point or so, were recorded by United States Steel Common, National Biscuit and General Electric.

AT MONTREAL

MONTREAL, May 21.—Trading on the local stock exchange at the opening of today's market was active and values displayed a firm tendency. Steamships preferred was by far most active stock, 2,350 shares changing hands in the first half hour. This issue was strong opening at 72 for a gain of two points, and later selling at 73 for a net gain of three points. Brazilian came next in activity and sold up 1/4 at 85. The Asbestos issues and Smelters were moderately active, both the new preferred and new common being unchanged at 76 and 24 1/2 respectively, while Smelters opened at 183 for a gain of 1/4 point. Spanish River preferred eased 7/8 at 108, Alcohol was up 1/4 at 173-3/4 and Attendé Eng. sold unchanged at 31.

Minister of Lands and Mines Endeavors to Interest Capital

OIL FIELDS LIKELY TO BE DEVELOPED

Tablet in Memory of Pioneer Geologist of Province Unveiled

HALIFAX, May 21.—Following the annual convocation exercises of the Nova Scotia Technical College here today, a bronze memorial tablet was unveiled by His Honor Lieut. Governor J. C. Tully, in the lower hall of that institution, to the memory of the late Hugh Fletcher, pioneer geologist of the province and the first to make a mineral survey of Cape Breton, which he did in 1872.

In an interview prior to the unveiling of the tablet, Hon. G. S. Harrington, Provincial Minister of Mines and Public Works, said that he believed gold mining prospects in Nova Scotia were as good as in any other province of the Dominion, and that his department was at present endeavoring to interest "outside" capital in this connection.

MUCH CAPITAL REQUIRED

Gold mining, the minister pointed out, was an expensive undertaking, and wealthy concerns, prepared to invest heavily, were needed for its successful development, at least so far as Nova Scotia was concerned. He believed the industry, as yet only in its infancy, would flourish as soon as operations were begun on a large scale by big interests.

The most likely districts so far investigated, according to the Minister, are in Halifax county, extending northward into Cansboro county, while geologists have also reported that parts of Hants county appear extremely promising.

Ministerial operations in Cape Breton, present underway in these territories, and Colonel Harrington is optimistic regarding them. The latter is said to have reported that the country around Northumberland Strait likewise offers rich returns, he added.

OIL PROSPECTS GOOD

Concerning the prospects for oil, which was undoubtedly plentiful in some districts, particularly in Cape Breton, near Lake Ainslie, where a summer well is to be operated during the summer, as well as the fact that the province is now paid to oil researchers than to gold, but that in the near future that commodity would be eagerly drilled.

His department, Colonel Harrington concluded, was making every effort to stimulate interest in the development of provincial gold mines and oil fields, and he expected these two natural products of the soil before long to result in thriving industries.

WIDOW WINS SHARE OF MILLION ESTATE

Virginia Court Decides Will Contest Among Descendants of Robert E. Lee

Mrs. Mary Middleton Lee of Washington, D. C., widow of Colonel Robert E. Lee, grandchild of the Confederate hero, has won a half interest in the estate worth more than \$1,000,000 left by General W. H. Fitzhugh, the father of Dr. Lee and Colonel Lee.

At historic Fairfax Courthouse, identifying the Lee, Lee, and Fairfax families for generations, where the will contest, was tried, Judge Samuel D. C. Lee, in a decision given today to Mrs. Mary Middleton Lee one-half interest in the estate worth more than \$1,000,000, and the other half to the Lee family.

But the most valuable part of the estate is the business property in Richmond, situated on Broad street, near Sixth, worth nearly \$1,000,000, and which rents for about \$45,000 a year.

NOT TO SELL EQUIPMENT

PROPER CONTROL OF HOUSING URGED

Slums Are Fruit of "Unrestrained Economic Pressure," Architects Told

TORONTO, May 21.—The first thrust to be drawn from the side of civilization is over-density of living conditions, Noulan Cauchon, of Ottawa, past president of the Canadian town planning institute, told the Ontario Association of architects here.

Mr. Cauchon said that slums were the "fruit of unrestrained economic pressure." He thought that if proper control of building construction was brought into force in Canada, with laws providing for window areas proportionate with room areas, slum and other unhealthy living conditions could be combated. "Let there be no dark, damp, foul styes to breed human degradation and despair," he declared.

PRICE CUTTING CONDEMNED BY J.T. CROWDER

Retail Merchants' President Tells Moncton Men of Conditions

MONCTON, May 21.—A large number of members of the Moncton branch of the Retail Merchants' Association assembled at the Bonaccord House last evening to welcome to the city Joseph T. Crowder, of Vancouver, president of the Retail Merchants' Association of Canada. Mr. Crowder was introduced to the members present by the local president, Mr. A. Syvertsen, who presided. Mr. Crowder discussed the war against price cutting. The question was a vital one to retailers all over Canada, said Mr. Crowder. The war had been started in British Columbia last August when officers of the Retail Merchants' Association of that province decided to discover the effect of price cutting on nationally advertised goods. He dealt with groceries, basements with lower rents, with chain stores and the system of price cutting. Certain articles were sold for a day at less than wholesale prices, while in some cases standard articles were continually sold under wholesale prices.

Retailers in Canada did four billion dollars worth of business last year. Isn't that a business worth keeping and encouraging? he asked.

He made a plea for closer co-operation among the three great trade branches, manufacturer, wholesaler and retailer.

SUIT OVER SONG

New York Publishing House Claims "Lullaby Blues" Was Pirated

An injunction and accounting suit was filed today in the federal court, New York, recently by Edward E. Marks & Co., to restrain Irving Berlin Inc. from further use of the song and music of "Lullaby Blues," which it is alleged was pirated from the copyrighted song "Arcady," later known as the "Lullaby Blues," and credited to Arthur Johnston and Dane Dwyer.

The complaint alleges that the authors of the song and music were Lester and James O'Keefe, who were associated with the plaintiff and are known as Allen White and Robert Stark. Another similar suit was filed by the plaintiff.

Y. M. C. A. MEMBERS NOW NUMBER 474

Including Women and Girls, 641 Persons Used Equipment in Moncton

MONCTON, May 21.—The annual meeting of the Young Men's Christian Association was held in the Y. M. C. A. rooms, last evening. The president, J. Fred Edgett, presided, and representatives were present from the Y. W. C. A. The senior Y's Men's Club, the Other Y's Men's Club and of the association, Messrs. R. H. Bannan, S. L. Holder, E. G. Williams, A. W. Clough, J. A. Pincock were elected directors to fill vacancies of the board. President Edgett in his address said that to date there are 474 members in the boys and men's departments.
