MARKS OF SUSPECTS British Racing Men Claim MAY BE WITHHELD There Are Too Many Derbys

LONDON, July 10—British racing circles are again clamoring for the extinction of all the "secondary" Derbys in the world.

There are now, according to the records here, seventeen races throughout the world which call themselves "Derbys"; that, according to pundits, is exactly sixteen too many.

There is only one real, genuine "Derby" and that, it is maintained, is the one founded by the 12th Earl of Derby in 1780 on the great downs at Epsom.

But Scotland, Ireland and Wales has each its own "Derby" and even the light Derby, and the Chicago Derby.

King of England has, in the past, called one of his pet races during his own private race meeting at "Royal Ascot" by the familiar and affectionate name; he has, up to this year, called the third race in his private program on Ascot Wednesday "the Ascot Derby." Yielding gracefully to the purists, King George this year called that race the "King Edward VIII Stakes."

In each of the Dominions there are two or three "Derbys" and in the United States there are the Kenteucky Derby, the Latonia Derby, the Brooklyn Derby, and the Chicago Derby.

350 FIGHT FIRES SEVOGLE RIVER Mussolini Blamed in Move

Change of Wind Has Partly Removed Danger of Settle-

NEWCASTLE, July 9—The forest fire situation remains unchanged. More men have been sent up to the fire on the Sevogle making about 350 fighters in that locality. The change of the wind has altered the fire's course and it is hoped that none of the settlements will be burned, but the fire is raging as fiercely as ever. RAIN IS ONLY HOPE.

FREDERICTON, July 9—Provincial Forester, L. S. Webb tonight stated that the day had been a better one for fire fighting. The Sevogle fire was still raging fiercely and causing considerable trouble, and there was also a large fire on the Nipisiquit near the Bathurst mines. On the Dongarvon the fire had not spread much today. The only hope for any great change in the situation, Mr. Webb said, would be in rain, and he did not see any indications of
