### FIRPO TAKES TO CENTRAL PARK TO ESCAPE HIS MANY ADMIRERS

New York, Sept. 20.—A national hero in his native South America, Luis Angel Firpo is somewhat of an adopted hero in our own United States and particularly in this city. Evidence of his popularity is furnished daily. Before the Dempsey bout Firpo was popular, but his popularity has grown tremendously since the battle. Last Saturday a crowd hung about the entrance to the apartment house where Guillermo Widmer, Firpo's secretary, makes his home, waiting eagerly for a glimpse of him. On Monday Firpo had to take his conspicuous automobile and spend the afternoon touring through Central Park to escape the crowds of hero worshippers. By actual count, according to Widmer, Firpo traversed every motor lane in Central Park eleven times, and when the party returned to Fifty-first street and Broadway it was necessary to park Firpo's car in an adjacent street to escape the crowd. Firpo received hundreds of telegrams and cablegrams of congratulation yesterday, one of the messages coming from Algeria.

New York, Sept. 20.—Luis Angel Firpo will return to his native Argentina without engaging in further bouts here this year, unless an unusually profitable offer is made for him to remain for another heavyweight battle. This statement was made by Guillermo Widmer, Firpo's secretary and interpreter. According to Widmer, the South American giant plans a short trip to Canada, after which it is likely that Firpo will return to Buenos Aires for the winter.

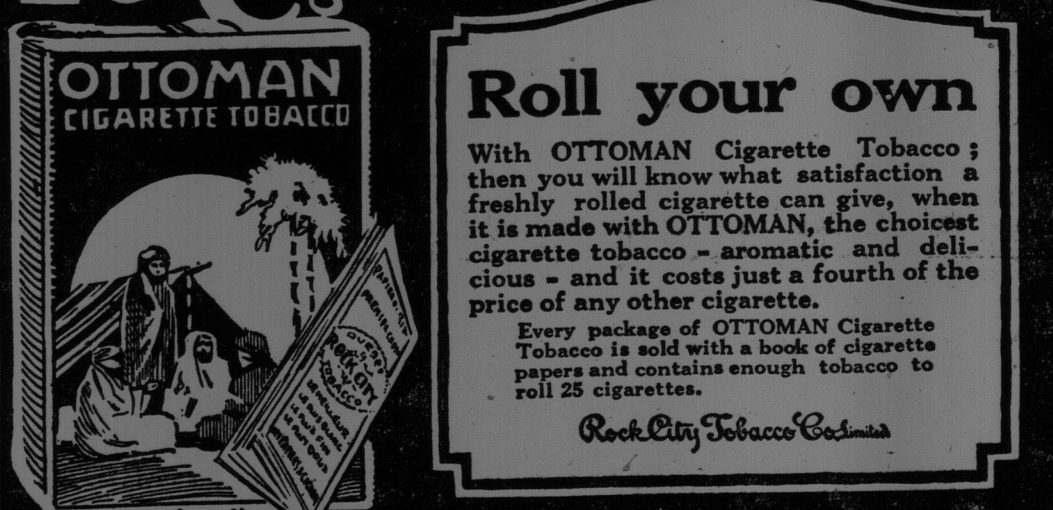
