APPEAL MADE IN BANKRUPTCY CASE

Solicitors for Baird & Peters Give Notice in Wetmore Grocery Matter. Notice of appeal from the judgment of Chief Justice McKeown of the Bankruptcy Court in the matter of George R. Baird, trustee, and Baird & Peters, solicitors for Baird & Peters, Ltd., according to Francis Kerr, trustee of the Bankruptcy Court. The case will likely come before the full bench in the Appeal Court at Fredericton about the first of the year. Mr. Wetmore was the proprietor of a chain of five cash grocery stores, and, according to Baird & Peters, was under agreement to give over possession of goods purchased from them in event of his failure to pay for them. On October 30, Baird & Peters took possession, but on the action of other wholesale grocers in the city the Canadian Credit Men's Trust Association was appointed interim receiver and application was made to make the appointment permanent. After hearing the case, Judge McKeown ruled that a debt was due and owing to Geo. E. Barbour & Co., Ltd.; that Mr. Wetmore was a bankrupt under the Bankruptcy Act, and he confirmed the appointment of the receiver. He also set aside a motion made by W. H. Harrison on behalf of Baird & Peters to have the goods returned to Baird & Peters and ordered that they be turned over to the receiver or accounted for to the Trust Association. It is from this decision that the appeal is being made.

HAVE PASSED MUSQUASH.

Favorable progress is being made by the Telegraph Department of the C. P. R., who are installing a telephone system along the Shore Line Railway from Bay Shore to St. Stephen, a distance of eighty-two miles. Today the men have reached a point one and a quarter miles past Musquash. It is expected that the line will be completed by the end of December. At the present time two gangs are working on this new installation, but by December 1 a third will be ready to assist. DAMAGED AUTO TO BE INSPECTED

Judge Finds for Allaby, But in Doubt as to Amount Due Him. That the responsibility for damage rested on the defendant was the decision of Judge Barry in the County Court today after hearing evidence in the case of P. D. Allaby against William A. Harding, but a verdict as to the amount of damages to be assessed was deferred. Mr. Allaby's claim was for \$148 damages, alleged to have been caused by Mr. Harding in an automobile collision near Nauyasagwak in July. According to the evidence, the damage was done when Mr. Harding's car attempted to pass Mr. Allaby's, but both parties contended that the other was responsible. After hearing the testimony of Mr. Allaby and Mr. Harding, the judge found that Mr. Harding was at fault. He was in doubt, however, as to the amount of damage, and named J. W. Comeau as a disinterested inspector, and judgment as to the amount of the damage will await his report. W. R. Scott appeared for the plaintiff, and G. Earle Logan for the defendant.
