ADVANCE GUARD OF PROPAGANDISTS

Washington, Nov. 2-The advance guard of the propagandists, representing nationalities who emerged from the Paris Conference dissatisfied with the terms of the Versailles Treaty, has arrived ir the person of Sailendra Nath Ghose as the spokesman of the Gandhi movement in India.

Ghose, who arrived here today, immediately became busy and gave out a statement telling of the movement to establish a republic in India. This statement of great length and filled with historic illumination, traced the revolutionary movement in India from the year 1867, and the troubles India has had since the signing of the armistice.

The agitation which the Gandhi followers have been making in India has, through a commission sent here, apparently been transferred to the United States in the hope of enlisting sympathy


After telling of the revolt against English rule of India, the statement ends with the declaration that the movement now under way is a declaration of war on the part of India.

As for the Government's budgetary situation, that is certainly not yet on a completely sound masis, nor can it be so, as long as the State has to bear the heavy burden of reparations. Nevertheless, real progress has been made; because according to the present estimate, the ordinary budget for 1922 will just about balance. Heavy reductions in expenditure, the Treasury will next year have to borrow only one-half of what it has borrowed this year.

In addition to this the state will most probably repay the Banque de France at the end of next December 2, 000,000,-000 francs on account of the bank's advances of 25,000,000,000. The whole financial policy of the Government aims at gradually reducing these advances, arriving eventually at restoration of gold payments, though this result will, of course, not be attained for some considerable time to come. There are people who approve further paper inflation, but they have not the upper hand in France, and it is not at all probable that their theories will prevail.
