OREGON WHICH LEFT HERE IN DECEMBER MISSING THREE MONTHS

Halifax, N. S., April 15.—There is but slight hope of the schooner Oregon of Lunenburg ever being heard of again. She sailed from St. John for Shelburne in December, 1913, took in lumber and sailed to Barbados about January 3. She has since been reported. Those in the crew were: Master, William Elsenhauer; Liverpool mate, Edmund Chabson; St. John's mate, James L. L. Cook and Steward, Benjamin Long, of Philadelphia; seaman, Arthur Hallmann, of Hamburg; Valdemar Johnson, of Denmark; and Myrdal Trueman, of Halifax.

Unionist Thunder Urges Home Rule Arrangement

Resumption of Parliament After Easter Recession—Signs Are That There Will Be Agreement on Government For Ireland

London, April 15.—With the resumption of parliament after the Easter recess, there is renewed hope that the home-rule problem will be settled by agreement. The government's decision on postponing the introduction of the budget for a week is attributed to a desire to provide a period in which stock of the Irish situation may be taken. It is understood that Premier Asquith intends to invite the Unionist leaders to join in a renewal of the decision with a view to a compromise.

Synopsis—The southern disturbance is moving very slowly northward and now covers the Ohio Valley and middle Atlantic states, while rain is falling as far north as Lake Erie.
