The "Sagona" From Labrador

Not Much Improvement in the Fishery There

The S. S. Sagona arrived from Labrador at 5 p.m. Friday last. She had a succession of N. and N.E. winds with weather going down, and went as far as Hopedale. She had fine weather coming South and made a quick run up to Battle H. The Hump, which is doing the Northern Labrador mail service, reported to Captain Parsons that the fishery on the Northern part of the coast was very poor.
 The Hump was down as far as Eclipse Hr., 40 miles South of Chidley, where though the season was so advanced, there was a heavy jam of ice, and so extensive, that no water could be seen North. She reported one schooner at Eclipse Hr. which did well. When they put out their trap they got 40 qts in the next, and reported plenty of fish. From that South of Hopedale on August 10th all the schooners had nothing to trap. They were jigging a few fish, but of course there has been time enough to make up for the short season.
 Fishery was an exception and the Capt. Sam Bob Winsor loaded with 950 qts and was on his way up as well as Bragg. The Esquimaux right along were jigging some fish up to Turnavick. At West Turnavick Capt. Bartlett had 300 barrels; at East Turnavick nothing of any account.
 Hak—Little with hook-and-line. Going down two schooners there had 150 qts each. The Dunns at Makovick did not do much. There

was a good deal of fish on the ground but nothing to be trapped. Iron Bound Islds.—Schooners run from 200 to 300 qts, shore men the same.
 Ragged Islds.—14 schooners there did very well and still doing so. Several of the shoremen had done so well that they could afford to give their traps to the schooners. Fish lately had slackened off.
 Cape Harrison—Very little done; 2 schooners there had full fares, as they had choice berries; one had 400 qts the other 500 and the rest from 100 to 200 qts; shoremen from 100 to 200 qts.
 Sloop Cove—Kennedy's had about 300 qts. They had 90 qts as the ship went North.
 From Helton to Emily, Horse and Indian Harbors, Cut Throat, Splitting Knife and all along that section they are doing fair. Boats with hook-and-line from 100 to 120 qts, two with 150 qts each. The two Gosses with 200 each for their traps. Harvey had 400 qts. The rest averaged fairly and cod was plentiful on the ground and would not trap. Hook at Helton had 500 qts. There was plenty of fish on the ground but they were very scarce.
 Cut Throat—Some schooners 300 to 400 qts; one had 500.
 Five Islands—One schooner loaded.
 Indian Hr.—8 small schooners with hook-and-line fares averaging from 180 to 220 qts. About five hands in each crew. Fish struck off blankly so that they could not finish. On the outside ground, however, one boat brought in 100 qts in four offers. The shoremen here did poorly.
 White Bears—Jigging four to five qts per day.
 George's Island—Snow had 300 qts.
 Indian Islands—Nothing doing.
 Pecks Hr., Long Island, Cape North, Curlew, S.E., last night along to Black Island—Nothing doing.
 Grady—Nothing doing since ship went North. McKee had little fish.
 Indian Tickle South—Doing fair in places, mostly with hook and line but bait-catch.
 Bolsters Rock to Spear Hr.—Doing fair. When coming South some had 300 to 400 and 500 qts. Manus people at Snug Hr. had 500, that was the best.

Germany's Bluff

Berlin, Sept. 1—The German Admiralty to-day advanced the suggestion that the submarine which may have torpedoed the steamer Arabic has possibly foundered or had been sunk by British. A high official of the Admiralty again declares that there is absolutely no news of the sinking of the Arabic yet available. The official would not state whether one or more submarines in question still were out, nor how long any vessel had been away from its base but stated suggestively that they seldom remain out longer than three weeks and usually report any torpedoing operations from eight to fourteen days and rarely later than a fortnight after the occurrence.

Russians Make Capture

Petrograd, Sept. 1—Successful Russian counterattacks in Stripa River district in Eastern Galicia are reported in the Russian official statement. The Russians claim to have captured 300 prisoners, 30 cannon and 34 machine guns.

French Advance In Vosges

New York, Aug. 28—A London cable to the Herald says that the French, by sharp actions in the Vosges in which they have overcome innumerable obstacles, have straightened out their front north of Sonderach, and are believed to be about ready for their final operations against Munster and the Lower Frenth Valley. For more than two months the French Alpine troops, together with large bodies of line infantry, have been engaged in a consistent advance that no one has been stopped. Progress has been slow necessarily.

Arabs Turn on Turks

Rome, via Paris, Aug. 23—Said Idriss, one of the most powerful of the Arabian chieftains in Yemen, and who during the Elyan War was aided by the Italians, is reported to be fighting against the Turks. He has gathered his men about him, it is said, and expects to march on Hodeida and free the Yemen region from Turkish dominion.

Bulgaria Threatened

Berlin, Aug. 30—The Overseas Agency says that Bulgaria previously reported to have signed a treaty with Turkey has postponed the ratification of the agreement on account of a sharp warning from the Entente Allies. According to reports the News Agency states Bulgaria has postponed for some days the signing of the Treaty with Turkey, the Quadruple Entente having notified her that such an action at the present time would be regarded as a "wilfully unfriendly act."

How To Keep Well

The most important thing in keeping well is perfect elimination. For one's body to be in a state of true health elimination must be perfect. To keep in healthy elimination must be constantly maintained. If this process is interfered with, the body becomes clogged, the effects matters of the blood, the excretory organs and the glands fail to pass outside become absorbed into the blood current and are then carried into the tissues and causing illness and disease.

Nearly 50 per cent of ill that the human body is heir to can be traced to imperfect elimination. The fountain head of perfect health, mental and physical efficiency is perfect elimination. In mechanical progress, as well as human economy perfect elimination is important. No captain of industry would dream of attempting to run an industrial plant without first laying a solid foundation of perfect elimination, from the power plant to the smallest lathe. Every possible aid known to modern science is installed in the boiler room where the power needed to run the machines is created. No expense is spared to keep the fire grates clear of clogging ashes and clinkers. An x-ray watch is kept on the boilers to prevent scales forming in its multitudinous tubes. The water which makes steam is both strained and purified at a great expense to prevent this. From the power house to the machine shop the constant cry and thought is "Keep up perfect elimination!"

So it should be in the human body. Without perfect elimination the body becomes clogged, non-efficient, non-producing, and finally goes to the scrap heap of mankind—the sick bed or the hospital. Along the trail of imperfect elimination follows headache, dizziness, and finally positive non-producing illness, and worst of all, chronic illness.

London, Aug. 21—A despatch to the Morning Post from Petrograd says: "In addition to the German losses previously reported in the Riga battle, a German submarine was run ashore on the coast of Dago Island (in the Baltic Sea just outside the Gulf of Riga), and doubtless also is lost."

Married Men Can Go

The consent of the wife is no longer required before a married man can enlist, neither is the consent of the parent necessary for men of eighteen and over. This ruling of the Canadian Militia Department was officially announced last week. The elimination of these requirements has come as the result of the large number of refusals on the part of women and parents to release their husbands and sons for military service at this critical time. There should be a very large number of men affected by the new ruling who will immediately go into uniform for the front.

Victims of the U-Boats

London, Aug. 28—German submarines have caused the death of 1,736 civilian non-combatants including 118 Americans, since German warfare on merchantmen was formally launched, February 18.
 The Lusitania's death toll of 1,157 on May 7th was the largest. The liner Palapa was sunk March 28th with a loss of 111 lives. Best available information shows 32 persons aboard the Arabic missing and probably dead.

To Get After The Shirkers

London, Aug. 30—The News of the World says that a Cabinet committee, consisting of Lord Selborne, the Marquis of Crewe, Winston Spencer Churchill, Austen Chamberlain, Lord Curzon and Arthur Henderson, is preparing a report on the question of recruiting and on enlistment.
 The newspaper hints that the report will recommend that the United Kingdom follow the South African precedent, under which each locality is obliged to furnish its quota of men.

Falling off in Sale of False Teeth

According to the United States Public Health Service, there will be a falling off in the sale of false teeth in the future. This is due to the discovery of a new cause and method of treating what is known to the scientist as pyorrhea dentalis and alveolar or Riggs' Disease. This is a suppurative condition of the roots of the teeth. At one time or another practically everybody has Riggs' disease, which is caused by a minute single-celled parasite which destroys the delicate membrane which surrounds the roots of the teeth and causes them to fall out.

The necessity of good teeth in order to have good health has been long recognized, but only recently doctors worked out the relationship between decay of the teeth and Riggs' disease on the one hand, and rheumatism, heart disease on the other. So firmly have these facts been proven that the up to date physician begins the treatment of such diseases by an inquiry into the condition of the teeth and their sockets. If these are found to be diseased, the condition is cured before the treatment goes further. The discovery of the cause of Riggs' disease is therefore of the very greatest importance.

It has long been known that pyorrhea would cure the diseases which are caused by infection of the intestines with endamoebae. From this it was deduced that a similar treatment would cause the destruction of endamoebae in the mouth. This was found to be the case, and emetin, the form of the drug used, is now administered by physicians for the cure and prevention of the disease. It takes considerable time to get rid of all the malignant germs in this way, but the results have been remarkably good. The treatment is both local and general.

In preventing mouth disease, it is important that the mouth be cleaned several times a day, and that a dentist be visited frequently to remove the tartar and the yellowish matter which accumulates along the inner edges of the teeth and between the teeth. This is particularly important in the case of children; because it has been found that many a child is apparently dull who is in reality suffering from a chronic poisoning produced by a mouth full of decaying teeth.

The number of sufferers from Riggs' disease in the U. S. is very large, and the U. S. Public Health Service is daily receiving inquiries as to the method of curing and preventing the disease.
