history there have been different systems of union. The old empire of Spain insisted on a religious unity throughout her lands and that was a failure. Germany to-day is compelling ner unwilling subject states like Poland to adopt the German language and have a lingual unity. Fiscal unity was tried by the British Empire over a hundred years ago and was abandoned as much in the interests of the home country as in those of the great DEATH OF PIONEER colonies. Whatever the future may bring forward I am clearly of the view that at the present moment the prac tical basis of greater union of the Em pire is unity for defense. Here w have an identity of interest for every part that requires defense whether it be a remote island in the Pacific, the coast of British Columbia or the home country herself. The really great re sult of late Colonial conference was the practical centralization in case of war of all the fighting forces of the British Empire under the control of the war office in London. 




