UNDRESSED AND TRIED TO SLEEP ON STREET

A Teamster Made a Sensation Last Evening

Another Man Would Sit up all Night to See U. S. Consul—Hungry Family Tell of Drunken Father.

As a general rule Saturday morning's police sheet does not show the names of many prisoners, but this morning there were crowded on the prisoners bench 15 men, mostly all charged with being drunk.

One of the drunks, a teamster, amused about 50 young men, and afterwards shocked a large number of the residents on Waterloo street. He left his hat and coat on the sidewalk near the corner of Waterloo and Waterloo streets, and after performing an Indian dance about for half an hour disrobed on the sidewalk, and when naked lay down. The police were summoned and the man arrested.

Patrick Sullivan, a pedlar of shoe laces, and minus both legs, was fined \$8 for being drunk.

Charles Kain for being drunk on Union street was given a reprimand and fined \$5 or two months with hard labor.

Wm. McArthur, charged with obstructing the east side ferry approach, was remanded, and as he said he was not at work for a couple of months was told he might be sent to jail as a vagrant.

Charles Broadfoot charged with being drunk on Main street, pleaded not guilty. Policeman Perry said the defendant was drunk and refused to go off the street as he said he was going to wait until morning to see the American consul. He was fined \$4.

George Brown, charged with drunkenness, said that he was arrested in his own yard. He had been drinking and his wife refused to let him in his house and then gave him in charge of the police. Policeman Scott said that McNamee who made the arrest was unable to be in court owing to injuries received by a kick from Brown.

Thomas Robson, who witnessed the arrest gave evidence of Brown being drunk and resisting arrest. Brown was remanded to jail.

Brown's wife informed the policeman that there was no food in the house and the children were hungry. She requested that he be arrested so that something could not be done in court with him. After he was arrested Mrs. Brown tried to get his release.

Antonio Cleorecco, an Italian without any idea of the English language, was charged by I. C. R. Pollock Smith for being and lurking about the I. C. R. yard. He had a ticket for Bangor but not enough money to be passed by the United States immigration officials. The magistrate said that as Antonio had a ticket which enabled him to leave, the city did not want the Italian to care for. He discharged the prisoner and instructed the policeman to see that he was shipped out of the city.

Ten common drunks, mostly strangers, were fined \$4 each. Of the entire bench full of prisoners there was only one that had enough to pay a fine, while one wished to give a cheque. The bunch went to jail for Sunday or perhaps longer and if the latter the Rock Candy Mine gang will be increased in numbers on Monday.

Constable Wm. Smith who is one of the old officers who has "ways" of collecting taxes that are very annoying to some persons, was in court this morning and swore out an information against a Carleton resident for assault. Yesterday Constable Smith said everything would be all right if the man came to him and paid his taxes. It is quite apparent that the taxes have not been paid as the warrant for assault will go out.

The father of Barton Mercer was in court this morning and stated that Barton was a small boy and that Jas. Royme's dog had given him a severe bite on the face. The boy's lip was torn open and three stitches had to be put in it. The boy will be disfigured for life by the scap and Mr. Mercer wished the dog destroyed. The magistrate said that if Royme did not destroy the dog, and he was found guilty of having a ferocious dog, he would be liable to a fine of \$20 and would then also have to destroy the dog.

WANT PAY FOR THE TIME THE TIDE STOPS WORK

Ten men who have been engaged on the concrete work for the cold storage building now being erected off Main street, struck this morning.

Their grievance is that they were hired some few days ago at 47.5 straight time, nine hours a day, that the incoming tide twice a day causes them to lose a couple of hours a day and they have been losing time, not by any fault of theirs. Their wages were to go on at so much an hour. With the loss of time and hanging about the place while the tide is in they claim that to get nine hours work they have to be about the place from seven o'clock in the morning until late in the evening, and have asked Contractor Hague for an increase of 25 cents a day while their hours are so long. This was refused and the ten men quit work this morning.
