CERTAINLY FROGS

CAN TELL THE TIME

HOPPERSVILLE, Pa., Aug. 4.—Several students of nature assert that frogs are excellent clocks, and that by observing them at any hour of the day one can be accurately informed as to

the time.

Most persons have noticed that at different times during the day the sounds from the frog ponds undergo a change in note and in volume. This fact caused the investigation to be made with this result.

Early in the morning the calf frogs, which are the youngsters, announce in a shrill treble that it is "6 o'clock." This is kept up until all the animal world has been aroused. Then the froglets cease their labors.

FROGS LEGS MAKE ELECTRIC CURRENT

ELECTRIC CURRENT.

CROAKERS, Pa., Aug. 4.—"If electricity will make frogs' legs jump, then it follows, logically, that sufficient frogs' legs will make electricity."

This is the argument put forth by B. G. Dippy, a local scientist, who is regarded by his neighbors as being somewhat eccentric. Mr. Dippy thoroughly believes in the principles he has laid down, and says that if there were enough frogs he could light and heat the world and run all the trolley cars. He says that in order to demonstrate the solidity of his theory he caught a dozen healthy frogs and placed them in a machine, attracting to the legs of each a small electric wire. This wire in turn was connected with a small motor.

He then employed a small boy to tickle the toes of the frog, and with each kick an electric impulse was given to the motor. This was soon running at a high speed, and only stopped when the boy grew tired.

Mr. Dippy does not believe that eating frogs' legs will cause a person to become charged with electricity. A sufficiently high charge can be made by the restaurant keeper.

LILY PAD, Pa., Aug. 4—Caleb Watts is raising in a pond near here some of the largest frogs on record. For several years he has devoted his time to frog culture with a view to increasing the size of the succulent hoppers.

The demand for frogs is greater than the supply, and they readily bring \$1.50 a dozen. Especially large and selected frogs are worth \$2.50 a dozen.

Mr. Watts says that there is no reason why frogs should not grow to a weight of ten pounds. He believes they should be raised by hand and should be given plenty of rich nourishing food at regular hours.

He finds that a mixed diet of liver, cornmeal and flies brings the best results, and he has a half dozen or more frogs which weigh six or seven


