Synopsis of Canadian North- west Land Regulations

Any person who is the sole head of
a family, or any male over 18 years old,
may homestead a quarter-section of
available Dominion land in Manitoba,
Saskatchewan or Alberta. The appli-
cant must appear in person at the Do-
minion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency
for the district. Entry by proxy may
be made at any agency, on certain
conditions, by father, mother, son,
daughter, brother or sister of intend-
ing homesteader.

Duties—Six months' residence upon
and cultivation of the land in each of
three years. A homesteader may live
within nine miles of his homestead on
a farm of at least 80 acres solely owned
and occupied by him or by his
father, mother, son, daughter, brother
or sister.

In certain districts a homesteader in
good standing may pre-empt a quar-
ter-section alongside his homestead.
Price \$200 per acre. Duties—Must re-
side six months in each of six years
from date of homestead entry (includ-
ing the time required to earn home-
stead patent) and cultivate fifty acres
extra.

A homesteader who has exhausted
his homestead right and cannot obtain
a pre-emption may purchase a quarter-
section in certain districts. Price
\$200 per acre. Duties—Must reside
six months in each of three years, cul-
tivate fifty acres and erect a house
worth \$200.00.

SAD TRAGEDY AT SACKVILLE

SACKVILLE, July 29.—A sad drown-
ing accident occurred at the Inter-
colonial Railway reservoir this afternoon
which resulted in the death of Locke
Bembridge, son of Clifford Bembridge
of this town. The boy, who was fif-
teen years of age, left home in com-
pany with a number of younger boys
to go blueberrying. According to the
story told by the boys, when the party
reached the reservoir young Bem-
bridge went in swimming alone. He
went out beyond his depth and sank
within the sight of the other boys. The
latter pushed a small raft out toward
the drowning boy, but he was unable
to catch it.

The other boys at once gave the al-
arm and men hurried to the reservoir
to search for the lad's body. After
a short time it was recovered. The
drowned boy was particularly bright
and his parents have the sympathy of
the entire community in their bereave-
ment.
