est, as cakes are a feature of English cookery. The sweet tooth is always kept well supplied, and these are some of the popular ways of meeting the demand. They are not expensive and are worthy of a trial.

Derby, or Short Cakes.

Rub one pound of butter into two pounds of flour, add one pound of cur-rants, one round of good moist sugar and two beaten eggs mixed with half pint of milk; work the whole into a paste, roll it out thinly, cut it into makes and heat them about cakes, and bake them about five min-utes in a moderate oven,

Shrewsbury Cake.

Make a stiff paste of one and a half pounds of flour, three-quarters of a pound of sifted loaf sugar, a teaspoon-ful of pounded cinnamon, half a pound of warmed butter, and one egg with a liftle milly roll it out thin out Tound little milk, roll it out thin, cut found and bake on a tin, in a slack oven.

Small Plum Cakes.

Mix six ounces of powdered loaf Mix six ounces of powdered total ters sugar with one pound of flour, to Oranges, which add six ounces of butter beaten to a cream, three well beaten eggs, and one-half pound of currants; beat all to a stiff paste, which drop on floured to a stiff paste, which drop on floured Egyptian to a cream, three well beaten eggs, and one-half pound of currants; beat all to a stiff paste, which drop on floured tin plates, and bake in a brisk oven.

Plain Flum Cakes.

Beat six ounces of butter to a cream to which add six well beaten eggs; work in one pound of flour and half pound of sifted loaf sugar, half a pound of currants, and two ounces of andled peels; mix well together, put it into buttered tin, and bake in a quick oven.

Family Pound Cake.

Beat to a cream half a pound of but-ter, add one pound of dried flour, half a pound of powdered loaf sugar, half a pound of dried currants, four well beat, en eggs and half a pint of milk; beat well together and bake with care.
